Waterfront Whiffs

Fishing Activity Quiet for Present; Fall Charters; Shrimp Fishing Going On

With halibut and salmon fishing seasons over, these are dog days along the Prince Rupert waterfront, at least as far as those whose sole interest is in the fishing are concerned. For those who would follow other pursuits, however, there should be plenty to do in the activities of the war. The several Prince Rupert halibut boats which are identified with the Fishermen's Naval Reserve will continue uninterrupted in that work. The next fishing activity will be the herring. In addition to the demands of the reduction plants and for bait purposes, Prince Rupert district herring will be required this winter by Nelson Bros. Fisheries Limited Prince Rupert cannery which will be putting up canned herring with tomato sauce. It is also reported that the B. C. Packers plans to process herring at its Claxton cannery this winter. Meanwhile, it will probably be a few weeks before there is any movement in regard to herring although there are reports that there have been already some indications of herring around Tucks Inlet at the head of Prince Rupert Harbor.

Fall charters of Prince Rupert fishing vessels include the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative packers Hickey, Capt. Arthur Oswald, and Canawaka, Capt. Fred Walters, by Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. Prince Rupert cannery for packing chums from Queen Charlotte Islands. The Ogden, Capt. Marshall, has been chartered by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. for packing salmon to the Prince Rupert plant. The Cold Storage also has chartered Capt. George Cook's Teeny Milly for packing. The Ogden and Teeny Milly augment the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s own boats Chief Tapeet, Chief Seegay and W. R. Lord which are all busy packing.

The Alaska Transportation Co.'s steamer Tongass arrived in port at noon today from Ketchikan with fish for transhipment over Canadian National Railways. After discharging, the Tongass will sail in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.

Having made a trip since last Tuesday morning to Kincolith with Indian Agent James Gillett and Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson as well as G. W. Rudderham, who went north to carry out an overhaul of the power plant at the Naas River village, the Indian Department's cruiser Naskeena returned to port last night.

Shrimp fishing is now proceeding around the head of Prince Rupert Harbor, the boats engaged in this work being Shruball Bros., North Foreland, William Rudell's and William Bagshaw's Sea Boy and William Larkin's W.L.S. The shrimps are being taken and processed by Bacon Fisheries.

Like other establishments of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station has somewhat revised its activities so as to concentrate more on problems of direct importance to the efficient pursuit of industries on a war basis. The scientific staff these days is even busier than usual. Certain activities which may be said to have been more or less of a side issue class are temporarily suspended.

Harry Beale, who has not been seen at Prince Rupert for a couple of years, is at present relieving Kenneth Morrison as purser of the Princess Adelaide which was in port last evening. Mr. Beale, formerly well known as an assistant purser on the Skagway run, is now regularly purser of the Princess Mary on the Powell River route.

STORY OF ESPIONAGE

War-time espionage is the timely subject of "British Intelligence," a swiftly-paced melodrama, which is one of the features of a double bill picture program at the Capitol Theatre this afternoon and evening. Boris Karloff and Margaret Lindsay have the leading roles. The period of the picture is the First Great War and the spies whose activities it concerns are in the service of England and Germany. Karloff is a super-spy in the service of Germany who has managed to convince the British Intelligence that he is working for England. Miss Lindsay is also a counter-espionage operative. One of the features of the picture depicts an air raid over London during which Karloff sets off a time bomb designed to wipe out the entire British cabinet. Heroic action on the part of the intelligence department foils the plot.

The other picture on the program is "Ma! He's Making Eyes at Me," a blend of romance and comedy with colorful dance revues. Action revolves around the efforts of Tom Brown, a young press agent, to make American girls more fashion conscious. Constance Moore plays opposite Brown in the role of a pretty Broadway model. Supporting roles are taken by Anne Nagel, Richard Carle, Jerome Cowan, Elisabeth Risdon and Fritz Feld.
