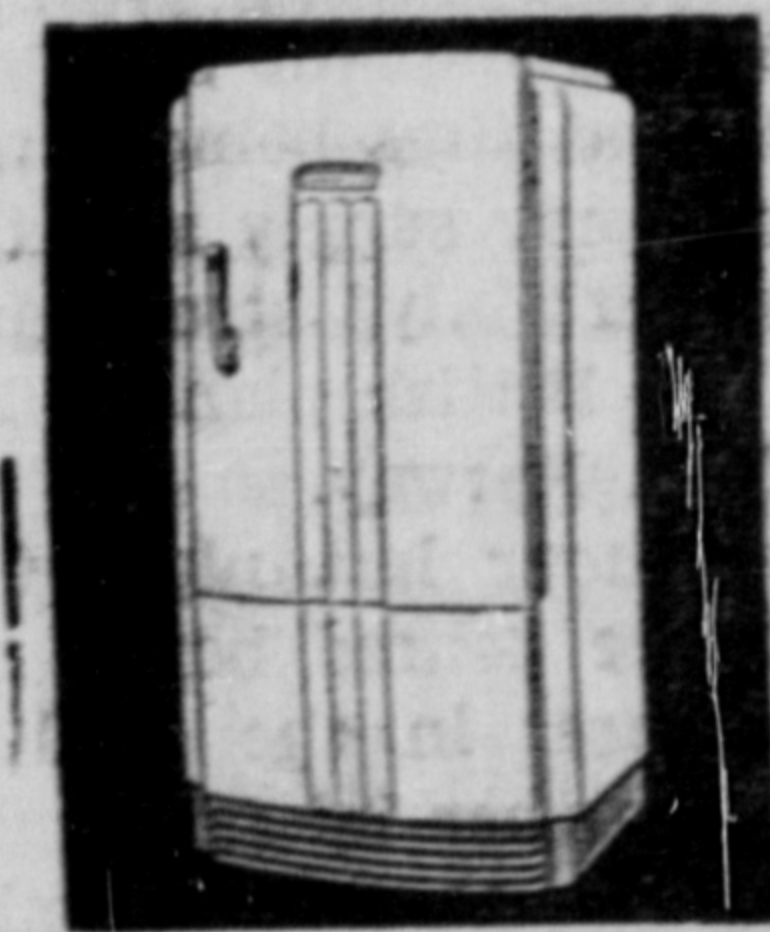

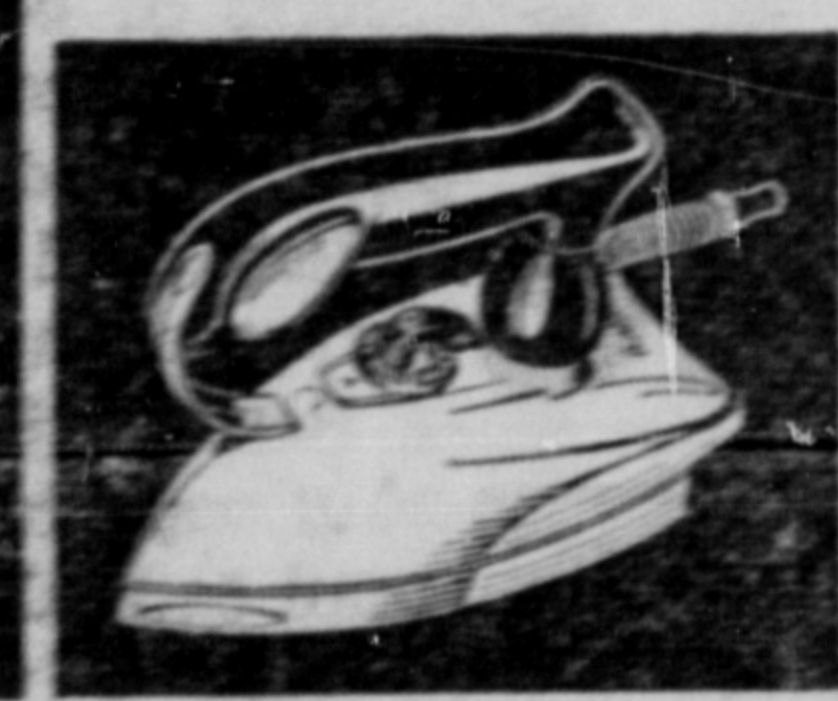

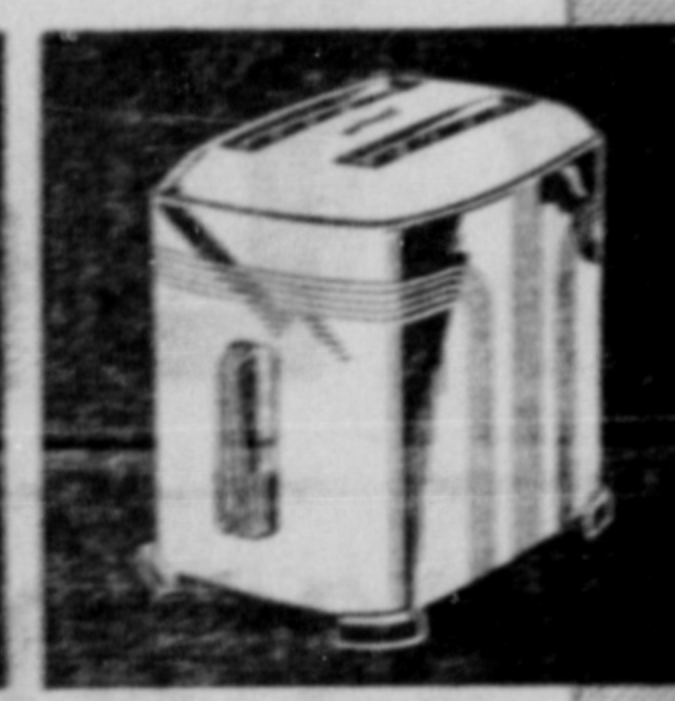

AN EXPLANATION

## REPORTS TO HIS CHURCH

United Church Congregation Hears About General Council Sessions

At First United Church yesterday the pastor, Rev. J. C. Jackson continued his account of the General Council of the United Church of Canada held recently in Winnipeg.

Right from the beginning with its declaration of loyalty the council was ever conscious of the titanic struggle in which the world was engaged and which the church stood firmly behind ready for uttermost sacrifice. The War Service Committee reported on the forty-five members engaged in the chain and auxiliary services. The church was also fully supporting the Red Cross Society with 50,000 women in three thousand groups working steadily. Every member of the military, air force and naval services had been supplied with a pair of socks. There was no jingoism but a stern appreciation of the right and the need for the whole backing of the church and its resources.

The urban problem was changing with the changing of urban populations and new remedies were being considered to rectify an unsatisfactory situation. A sign of the true democracy of the church was the reception of one hundred and seven memorials from individuals, groups and congregations. These were referred to the various committees where they received due consideration. The Home and Foreign Missions were ably represented by delegates—one from Honan, China; one from India, one from the mining camps of northern Ontario and Rev. Peter Kelly, chief of the Haidas, whose address was a notable feature of a notable council.

The report of the Women's Missionary Society was an astounding revelation of successful organization and effective execution. A commission reported very fully with a presentation of a statement of faith.

Dr. R. G. Large was soloist, giving a very fine rendering of Louise E. Stals' "A Prayer."

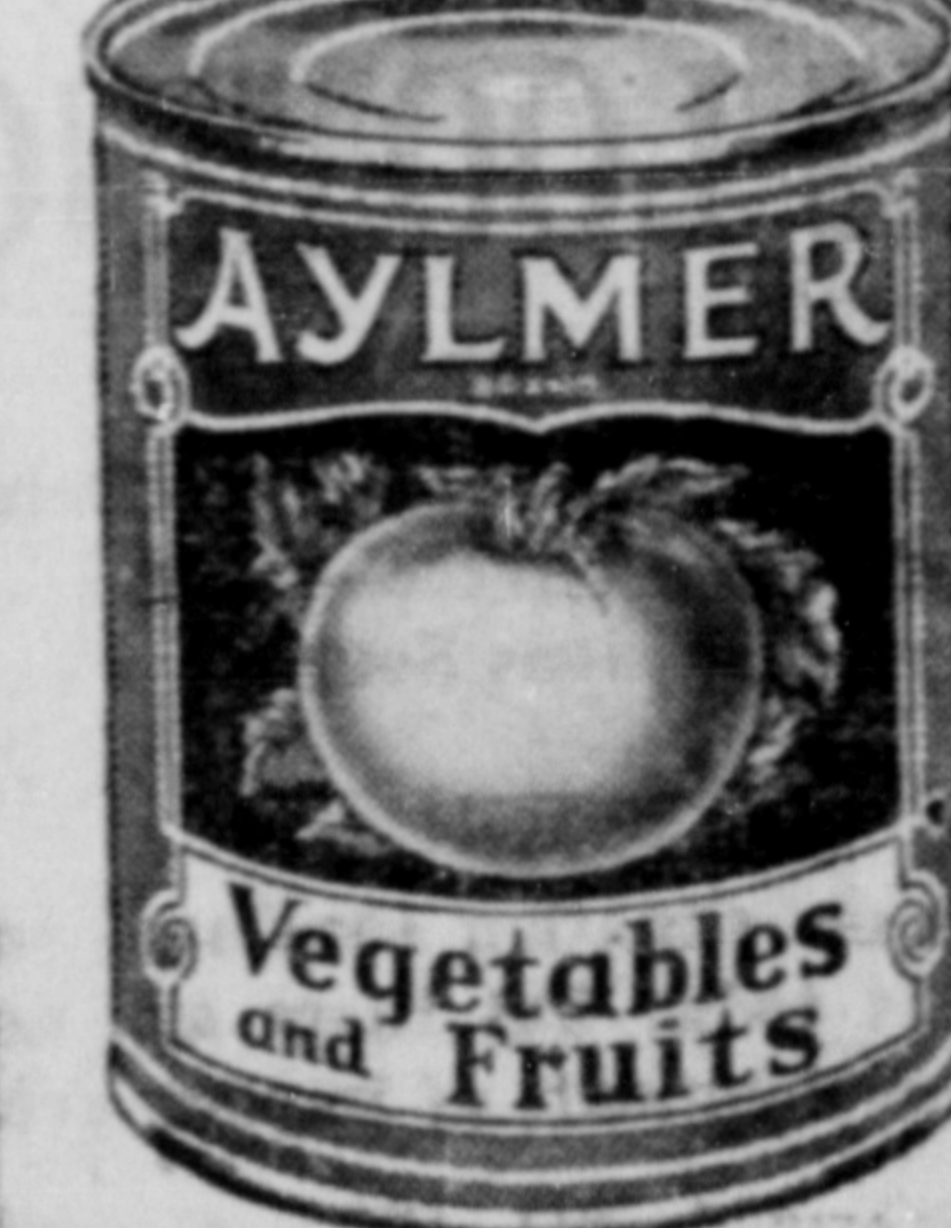
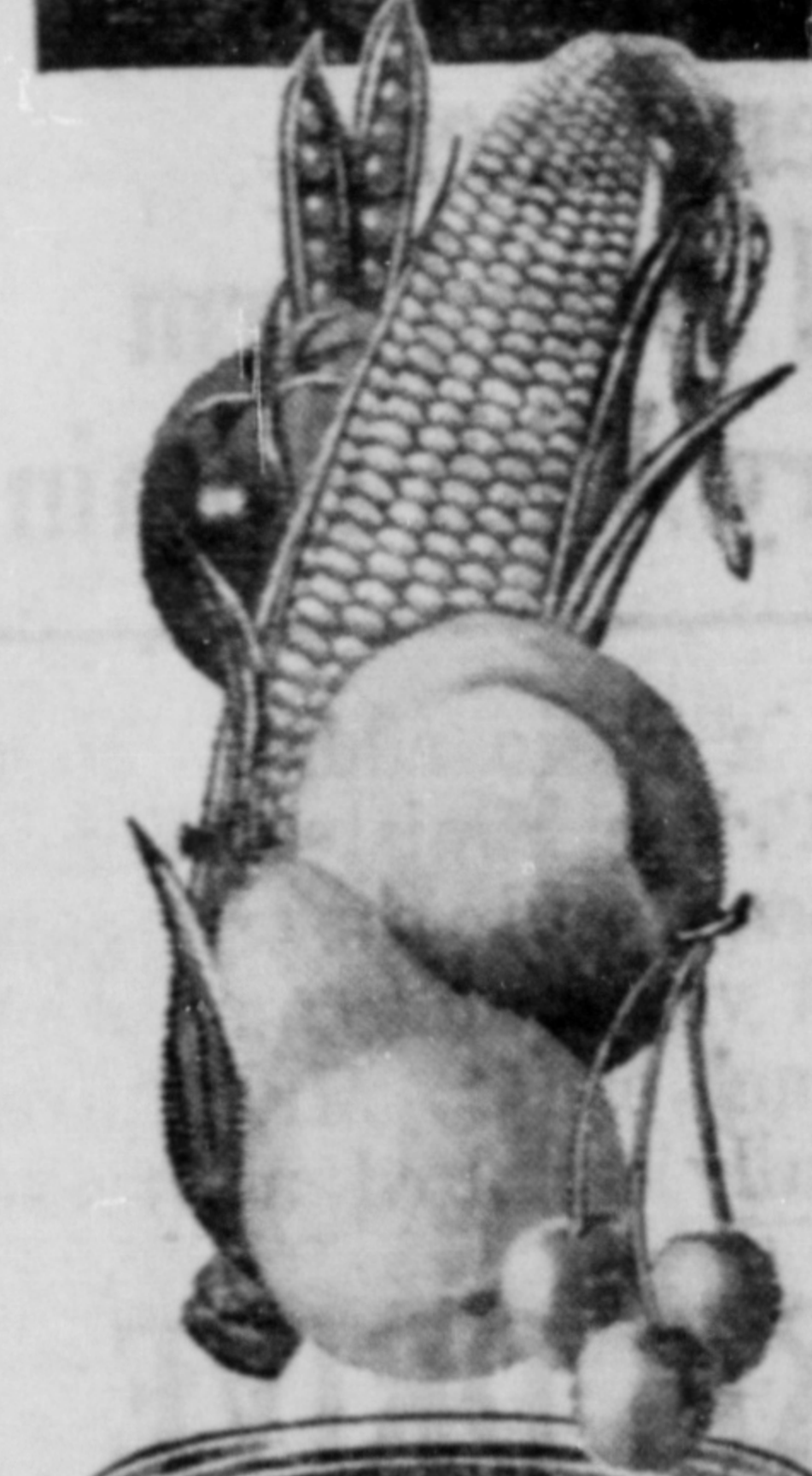
