WAR AIMS DISCUSSED

Capt. Elmore Philpott Gives His Ideas About Issues In Present War—Confident Of Ultimate Victory

The Nazi menace is not going to be beaten by November 15. There is no more chance of that than there is of Hitler crushing Britain by that time. "It will take us some years to restore any real stability to the world. We will be fortunate if we get along very much with the job by 1944 or 1945. I think we may expect a long war characterized by intermittent furious outbursts with long lulls between." So declared Capt. Elmore Philpott M. C. of Victoria in an address at the Canadian Legion Hall last night under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club.

Capt. Philpott suggested that the first stage of the war was that where the British were carrying the brunt. If the situation became desperate enough the United States was bound to come in "if not only to save their souls but to save their skins."

Outlining his idea of war aims, Capt. Philpott declared that the things for which Great Britain and the Empire stood had been won over a period of centuries at great cost. "First, we stand for established justice, something which it had taken thousands of years to win and develop but which the Nazis would sweep aside in a few months. Other aims were religious freedom, social rights and political control of government.

Democracy might be a long way from being perfect but it did give priceless privileges which should never be lost and for which the time had come to fight.

"And," continued the speaker "you can't win wars unless you attack, take the offensive. On the political front, too, the offensive must be taken." In this political offensive there would eventually be assistance from France, Italy, Spain and even Germany.

Britain And United States
Capt. Philpott reiterated the prediction that out of the present situation must come the out and out union of Great Britain and the United States. Within two or three years, he forecast, this will have become an accomplished fact. Then there will have been laid the cornerstone of a better government than the world has ever known with the dawn of a better age for all mankind. When that union came it would mean for the British Empire nothing more than the passing from one stage to another with a bigger and better job still to do.

In opening his address, Capt. Philpott gave an interesting account of the personal history of Adolf Hitler and the strange circumstances which had led up to his accession to power. Three years of miserable existence under privation in Vienna after the death of his father and mother had had an important bearing on Hitler's psychology, the speaker believed. When the First Great War came, he threw himself on his knees and thanked God that his opportunity had come. Since then he had never been off the German payroll. The technique of his career had always been along one line—the entanglement of other people in conspiracies which he used to his own advantage. The acceptance by the German people, great in many respects, of the crazy philosophies of an insane man, the speaker characterized as one of the "strangest exhibitions of stupidity the world had ever seen."


Speaking of Japan, Capt. Philpott expressed belief that the Japanese was not a primary menace. If Hitler was beaten, there would be no need to worry about Japan. Only if Hitler won would there be a real danger from the Japanese. "The only menace we need to worry about today is Nazism."

There was a large attendance at Capt. Philpott's lecture. Miss E. M. Earl, president of the Women's Canadian Club, was in the chair. Len Cripps sang "There'll Always be an England," the audience joining in the chorus. C. P. Balagno accompanied Mr. Cripps. Mrs. C. E. Cullin presided at the piano for "O Canada" and "God Save the King."

There was a silver collection for the dry canteen fund.
