EARLY DAYS ON SKEENA

From Diary of First Missionary to White People of District Prove Interesting

The Prince Rupert Rotary Club met yesterday afternoon Rev. W. F. Rushbrook told some interesting reminiscences of the early days in this district, based particularly on the diary of Dr. H. Sheldon, the first missionary to the white residents in the area embraced by the territory Deane Channel to Atlin and easterly to Fort St. James.

The diary says that in that time there were about five hundred people in that area and most were prospectors and miners at Lorne Creek and at other places along the Skeena River.

Sheldon was a medical missionary sent out from England by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. George Cunningham was a member of his congregation and his wife was the leader in all the work. When the doctor was in the city, Mr. Cunningham spoke highly of the work of Dr. Sheldon in an eulogy on his work.

George Cunningham was buried at Metlakatla in 1905. The diary spoke of the late Bob Johnson as being a great help in the work of the mission and of the burning of

kalum and Mrs. Cunningham. Mr. Inverness 47 years ago. It had had two fires since that time.

In the early days the cans had to be made at the cannery and charcoal in considerable quantities was used in the process. In 1896 there was a strike on the river, the cannery offering seven cents a fish for the sockeye and the fishermen demanding eight cents. Fishermen came from as far away as Skidgate.

In those days Professor Prince arrived from Ottawa to study the habits of the salmon and he had to make the rounds in a rowboat. Other interesting events included a race between the two stern wheelers—Hazelton and Mount Royal.

Two outstanding personages of the early days were Mrs. Ridley, wife of the Bishop of that name, and Mrs. A. J. Collison, wife of another missionary. Both of them had been nurses in the Crimean War. Mrs. Collison was at Metlakatla and Mrs. Ridley at Hazelton. While Bishop Ridley was of hearty demeanor his wife was just the opposite and she remained and carried on the mission work while the bishop was in England on one occasion.
