




During the first frightful days. many people believe that Norway had been betrayed by its own men. However, almost every case reported of inside betrayal proved false. Self-evidently, there were a few Quislings but Quisling's own experlences serve as the best proof that he had very little support eve among those closest to him. He had been in Berlin the week before been minutely prepared a very long time beforehand. Quisling returned to Oslo April 7. He was accompanied by a few of his Nazi friends. his guard. They finally proved to be the only real supporters he had. When he was ordered by the Germans to secure a Nazi government, which lasted only two days, he did not succeed in securing a single one! of them he appointed to actually serve.
