**Better Babies War Or No War**

Hospital Reports Lower Death Rate But Digs Another Trench

MANCHESTER, Eng., July 16: (CP)—Despite danger of German bombing from the air and restricted attention as the result of emergency measures the death rate of the Duchess of York Hospital for Babies has been much lower than usual this year, the hospital's annual report stated.

Available air raid shelters were limited, the report proceeded, and "demands on the hospital's services were so great that the board decided to provide a second shelter trench."

Soon after the war opened the major part of the hospital was evacuated to a suburb but a residue of premature infants, too ill to stand removal, and a ward of children with a streptococcal infection were left in hospital.

"Immediately the ambulances had left an almost moribund child arrived on the doorstep and we admitted it at once," says the report. "Of the rival risks of death from bombs and death from pneumonia the latter seemed more urgent. That policy we continued."

Within three weeks 50 per cent of the cots were again in use.

**Natty Breeches Bothered Swiss**

BERN, Switzerland, July 16: (CP)—Swiss women, incorporated into the army as ambulance drivers, telephone operators and in other capacities, began to wear as part of their uniform regular officers' breeches with shiny black boots.

They looked so smart they were criticized. Press and politicians asserted the costumes made the girls so conscious of appearance they couldn't do their work properly. Skirts were recommended instead of the breeches.

That only magnified and prolonged the controversy. Skirts, declared war workers, were not practical for army tasks.

Finally the government stepped in with a compromise. It decreed divided skirts for the auxiliary forces.

TORONTO, July 16: (CP)—Canadian newspaperman for 44 years, including 14 years at Ottawa, Paul Bilkey, editor-in-chief of the Montreal Gazette, has had a wide opportunity to consider "Persons, Papers and Things." He has written of them in a whimsical way in a book of this name published by the Ryerson Press. Sub-headed "casual recollections of a journalist with some floundering in philosophy" the work is bright in anecdote and retrospect, a pleasant tonic in the severity of current reading.

**MAY JOIN UNARMED**

LONDON, July 16: (CP)—"Encouragement and help they would be able to give in an unarmed capacity" would be good reason for clergymen enrolling in the "Local Defence Volunteers" says the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Halibut landings were heavy at Prince Rupert yesterday, Canadian boats being particularly numerous as many small boats came in with their final trips of the season following closing of Area No. 2 to fishing. The American landings for the day totalled 148,000 pounds for which from 9.5c and 7.5c to 9.8c and 7.5c was paid. The Canadian fares aggregated 95,000 pounds, 9c and 7c to 10.2c and 7c being paid.

Making her first voyage under new name of Camosun, the former steamer Prince Charles arrived in port at 7 o'clock this morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islandst and will sail tonight on her return south via the Queen Charlotte Islands. The Camosun is in command of Capt. Ernest Sheppard, well known Union master.

**Mother Consented to Son's Departure During German Advance**

LONDON, July 16: (CP)—Eight-year old Jacques Verger of France, found by a British officer in the Somme battlefield area of France during the German advance has been adopted and brought to England. Lieut. F. Barrett, his rescuer, said he found Jacques with his mother in a town on the Somme. The father had been killed.

Lieut. Barrett wanted to save one youngster from the horrors of machine-gunning and bombing. So he obtained the mother's permission to adopt Jacques. His wife will look after the boy until the war is over.

**GUNS NOT GOWNS NOW**

Socialist M. P. Leads Effort To Keep Dress Expense At Minimum

LONDON, July 16: (CP)—Not until the war has drawn to a close will Mrs. Edith Summerskill replenish her wardrobe.

Dr. Summerskill, Socialist member of parliament for West Fulham, has been admonishing women not to be so particular about new clothes during wartime. When it's a choice between gowns or guns—but there can be no choice where loyal women are concerned. The money must go for guns, tanks, airplanes and other necessities of war.

Dr. Summerskill, looking stylish and chic, explained that she hadn't bought a new dress since the outbreak of war. All she did was to "invest" in a couple of new belts and some white pique collars and cuffs to give old ones new life.

"I went to the Bishop of London's garden party in a dress and coat which I have had two years and which I wore on the same occasion last summer. It's my only 'arty frock' and will remain so for as long as the war may last.

"When all is said and done, women usually buy dresses only to compete against each other. Line is the important thing and that we can all achieve for ourselves. How? With a pair of scissors. By cutting away one or two of last year's frills or turning a full skirt into a narrow one.

"There are women who say it is wise to buy new clothes as an investment against the day when they become more expensive. They make me cross because they are so obviously thinking up excuses for themselves."

Dr. Summerskill said she has had letters from dozens of women who agree with her.

"Some of them—quite poor women—have sent me the few shillings which they had saved for a new hat or scarf saying they had decided not to buy them after all and would I see that the money went towards the national cause."


