very much like the mythical unicorn which was said to be the symbol of strength and chastity.

Pictures also showed the manner of dressing the hair among women. Girls were usually betrothed at 14 and married at 15. Naturally among people of that type evil spirits were supposed to have great power. Frankincense, which was made from the gum of a tree growing on the Arabian desert, was used largely in exorcising these spirits.

The speaker told of the singing sands heard at one place. He showed from pictures how the ancient customs practised was that of "ordeal by fire," used only to test if an accused person was guilty of murder.

People in the southern part of Arabia were quite different from those living farther north, being more negroid in appearance. Many of them could not grow whiskers whereas the true Arab had a rather generous growth of hair on his face. The Arab was distinguished chiefly from the fact that the ear was placed toward the back of the head instead of well forward as in other races.

When an Arab died he was always buried on his left side with the face looking toward Mecca.

Camels were used throughout the journey. They provided not only transportation for the people

and their supplies but also milk edge of the desert they discovered for food. During this journey much a lake and along its shore were time was spent collecting species of dead locusts. The locusts were used for food by the Arabs and considered a delicacy. However, he did not recommend them as a diet and neither did he recommend camel meat, something they had to eat part of the journey.

Dr. Thomas' lecture was enjoyed. He will speak again night at a public gathering in the Legion Hall, his subject "The Political Situation in Western Hemisphere."
