HON. GORDON SCOTT LOST

OTTAWA-Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King has received definite word from London of the safety of Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of munitions and supply, who was aboard the liner Western Prince which was torpedoed and sunk last week. Col. W. C. Woodward of Vancouver and E. P. Taylor of Toronto, special departmental officials, accompanying Mr. Howe, are also safe but Hon. Gordon Scott, former provincial treasurer of quebec, and financial adviser to Mr. Howe, lost his life when a lifeboat capsized alongside a rescue ship, his body not being recovered. The survivors have been landed at a west coast port.

QUIET FOR 30 HOURS

LONDON-For nearly thirty hours not a single bomb has been dropped anywhere on the British Isles. Unfavorable weather is believed to be the reason although this did not prerent the Royal Air Force last night from carrying out another raid on the German industrial city of Mannheim as well as Channel bases of the enemy, particularly airdromes.

ROOSEVELT'S PLAN FOR AID

WASHINGTON- President Franklin D. Roosevelt will make a personal appeal to the new Congress for support of a new arrangement whereby unlimited supplies of ships, gans, airplanes and munitions would be loaned to Great Britain as she required them. Such supplies would be on a lease basis whereby the goods would be returned or replaced after the war. Thus effective aid would be given to Great Britain and, at the same time, a United States defence policy would be carried out. The President may ask congress for \$2,000,000 to finance the program.

ITALIANS ABANDONING BARDIA

CAIRO—The Italians appear to be preparing to abandon Bardia, another important port on the Mediterranean coast of Libya. The Fascist forces, aerial reconnaissance indicates, are commencing to retreat toward Derna and Libya to the west.

TWO DIVISIONS SMASHED

ATHENS- Two crack Italian divisions in Albania are reported to have been smashed as the Greeks continue to advance on all fronts. Two focal points on the central Albanian front are in flames, having been set afire by the retreating Fascists.

DUTCH STEAMER SUNK

NEW YORK-Mackay radio has picked up a message from the Dutch steamer Hendrik reporting that she was torpedoed and sunk 500 miles north of Scotland. Only one lifeboat is left afleat, two others having been blown up with the ship. Further north two tankers are reported under attack.

GERMANS MOVE INTO ITALY

BELGRADE, YugoSlavia-It is reported here that 50,000 German troops have moved quietly into Italy enroute to Libya and, possibly, Albania to bolster the wavering Fascist forces. Some of the German troops are at Bari and Naples and others at Milan and Genoa, according to the report here.

QUITTING BARDIA

Italian troops were reported today by the Royal Air Force to be falling back towards Derna, 150 miles within Libya. The retreating forces were being harassed by British bombs and machine guns. Earlier reports from the Western Desert indicated that the main coastal base of Bardia was isolated by the British armored units to the west with fresh troops rolling up from the East. Apparently, the line was also closed on the south, making the retreat of the Italians a desparate movement. Derna airdrome has been raided by British aircraft and phamplets were dropped on Assab, advising the people there of the defeat of the Italians at various points.

The communique also said that offensive patrolling on a considerable scale had been renewed 2000 miles to the south on the Kenya and Sedan frontiers of Italian East Africa. Nairobi reports a British raid from Kenya Colony on Italian Somaliland in which 50 Italians were killed, 25 wounded and considerable enemy supplies taken.

Luftwaffe Attack on Britain Lightens up for Time Being
