Today, circumstances decide our fate and these circumstances are so much stronger! than we are, that we ought to look them in the face, adapt! ourselves to them with all our intelligence and with a clear! understanding of the consequences which might result! from a stupid obstinacy. The world which we have known up to now is falling around us. We must henceforth choose our place in the new world which will rise from this catastrophe. History has shown us, and events have confirmed it with a brutality beyond words, that small nations, even when they inhabit vast territories, need for their survival, the protection direct or indirect of one of the great powers directing the world.

"To this realistic conception of the life of nations, one might oppose a superior ideal, but we should be ignoring our most important social and economic interest! if we were to disregard political facts and pretend to forget our allegiance with the great nations which, as a whole, share our ways of thought and life. For a long time we have been able to delude ourselves with a fictitious insolation. Fundamentally, we have always had common cause with Europe and our great neighbor to the south. Hitler's ambition clearly shows us today that Canada, as Andre Siegfried wrote "is an international power!

which ought to act as such. "It said just now that circumstances are dictating our line of conduct. They are of such gravity that they also require us to consider them on a plane quite superior to that to which we have been accumstomed. This means that to safeguard our liberties, our language, our economic and social life we must cease every quarrel and every campaign which has not, for immediate object, the pursuit of the war and our final victory. Anything can divert us from our present task, from assuring our liberty and our national survival should be completely ignored. Only on this condition will we Canadians, a small people with great ideals, survive. Our reward will be according to the way! we act and the example we set now."

WHY WE SHALL WIN

Voltaire, the great French writer, said: "The English people are people who defend themselves." It is the knowledge of this that makes us sure that victory will come to our side. Canadians are helping, but it is the people of the British Isles on whom the brunt of the fighting will fall. They will fight, holding on like the British bulldog. They don't have sense enough to let go, even when beaten. That is why they will win.

ENLISTMENT DRAWBACK

One of the drawbacks to early enlistment in this war was the knowledge in some cases that as soon as a man, enlisted, there was a man unsympathetic to the cause who would step into his job. Now that all are to be called up. there can be no such objection. The unsympathetic person has no advantage over the others. If all are registered and taken as they are required there is no objection to duty on the part of any. It is the only democratic method of carrying on the war.




