CONVENTION UNDER WAY

Conceded That Roosevelt Will Be Renominated by Draft

CHICAGO, July 15.—With the consensus of opinion that President Franklin D. Roosevelt will accept a third term nomination by draft, the Democratic national convention opened here today. It is not expected the President's name will be placed in formal nomination but that there will be a draft resolution. At least 790 delegates are pledged to the chief executive. He himself has made no direct promise to run.

Senator Robert F. Wagner, chairman of the resolutions committee, indicates that the platform will include planks opposing the sending of American youths to foreign wars, approving Roosevelt preparedness policies, reaffirmation of the Monroe Doctrine, condemnation of totalitarian governments which would undermine world democracies and the security of human rights. Postmaster General James A. Farley, who managed the last two Roosevelt campaigns and who is supposed to be in the President's confidence as to third term intentions, said today that his name would go before the convention and would not be withdrawn until balloting was completed.
