Joined French Hospital

The outbreak of the First Great War interrupted a successful medical practice at Fort William and led him to turn down a flattering offer to join a world-famous surgical clinic at Chicago. It also marked the start of Dr. Manion's struggles for he had a fight to get into the army medical service. He went to France on his own and served in a volunteer hospital attached to the French army before he obtained an
