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S.S. Washington Stopped Today By Submarine

Over Thousand People Ordered To Leave Ship When Order To Proceed Given

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The state department announced today that the United States liner Washington with 1020 passengers on board en route from Europe, was stopped early this morning by an unidentified submarine, which ordered the abandonment of the ship.

The liner was on the way from Lisbon to Galway to pick up additional Americans.

The state department said that, upon the order to leave the ship, the lifeboats were being lowered and passengers and crew, the latter numbering 70 were ordered to get in. Some of the boats were actually being lowered when the order came from the submarine "Please go on."

LA GUARDIA LAUDS F.D.R.

OTTAWA, June 11 (Canadian Press)—"United States is nearer to the verge of war today than when the Lusitania was sunk during the last war," declared Mayor Fiorella La Guardia of New York yesterday.

"The President was magnificent," said Mayor La Guardia in commenting on Mr. Roosevelt's address on the international situation at the University of Virginia. "He went as far as he could without actually declaring war."

The New York mayor is to address the Canadian Federation of Mayors here today. "I was wondering what I would be able to say," he commented. "Now I'll be able to say as much as I want to."

BLOW BY TREACHERY

How London Feels About Entry of Mussolini Into War On Hitler's Side

LONDON, May 11 (Canadian Press)—Authoritative sources described the Italian entry into the war as a "treacherous blow" and declared that now the Italians are in the conflict they "must expect to be treated by us exactly the same as the Germans."

T. H. Hutchison, general secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association at Vancouver, after spending the past few days here in the course of a tour north in connection with the war auxiliary service of his organization, left this morning by plane for Allford Bay whence he will proceed to Vancouver.

BODY AT CAPITAL

OTTAWA, June 11 (Canadian Press)—The remains of the late Hon. Norman Rogers, minister of national defence, killed yesterday in an airplane crash near Trestonville, Ontario, arrived in Ottawa today from the scene of the accident. It is believed that motor trouble caused the crash which resulted in the death of Mr. Rogers and three members of the Royal Canadian Air Force plane crew.

Mr. Rogers had directed Canada's war effort since September 18 when he succeeded Hon. Ian Mackenzie as minister of national defence. Prior to that he had been minister of labor since 1935. He was born in Amherst, Nova Scotia, served as a private in the last war and was a prominent educationist, leaving a professorship at Queen's University to enter the cabinet of Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King.

Robert McCook Laid At Rest

Many Attend Funeral This Afternoon of Well Known Pioneer Citizen

Many old friends gathered at the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers this afternoon to pay final tributes of esteem and respect to the memory of the late Robert A. McCook, pioneer citizen, who passed away Sunday at the Prince Rupert General Hospital.

Rev. J. C. Jackson, pastor of First United Church, officiated and the organist was Miss Swanna Olafson. Hymns were "Nearer My God to Thee" and "O Love That Will Not Let Me Go."

Interment was made in the Masonic plot at Fairview Cemetery, deceased having been a member of the craft in his native Ireland.
