WAR EFFORT LEADERSHIP

Need For More Active Participation Seen by Legion—Employment of Veterans

The executive of the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, in session last evening in preparation for the regular monthly meeting of Wednesday, emphasized in common with all other branches the need for a more active participation in the war effort by Canada as a whole. There seemed, it was felt, a lack of vital definite leadership to crystallize the determination of Canadians to carry out with initiative. In this connection it was hoped that all members of the Legion would make a point of wearing their Legion badge at all times.

The matter of employment came up again. Registration for Home Guard duties was proceeding. The feeling was expressed that the age limit of 50 years was too low and it was hoped to have this changed so as to allow ex-service men who are fit to be engaged in the work that they are so well trained to do. Strong objection was taken to the policy that seemed to be followed locally where an ex-service man would have to canvas the majority of the members of the executive of an organization in order to obtain work. Ex-service men were not asked their political or religious affiliations when they enlisted for the last war and there was something seriously wrong if, now they had to canvas members of a party executive, for endorsement in order to obtain a job in the country for which they fought. Too long had the ex-service man been shouldered aside in favor of even naturalized citizens of a party. With another war on there would be no justification for putting party before national service.

Committees were arranged for the annual picnic to be held this coming Sunday to Digby Island. Approval was expressed of the voluntary registration now taking place in the city and full support is accorded the move.

U.S. Repudiates Nazi Currency

Credit Marks in Occupied Countries No Good Outside, Says N.Y. Authority

NEW YORK, June 11: (CP)—The New York Foreign Exchange Market views Germany's new 3,000,000,000 mark credit for use of the invading armies in the Netherlands, Belgium and occupied territory in Northern France as mere "printing press currency" of no value outside the Reich and German occupied territories. Latest statements of conditions of the Reichsbank show gold and foreign exchange coverage on the mark is about 63-100ths of one per cent.

EDMONTON, June 11: (CP)—Hon. Solon Low, provincial secretary, was assured of election on Saturday in Vegreville when his only opponent withdrew. Election date is June 20. ARE READY TO ASSIST

Prince Rupert Men Give Ready Response to Voluntary Registration

Desire of Prince Rupert men to assist actively in the war was amply demonstrated last night by the ready response to the first session of receiving of voluntary registrations for national defence. The committee members and their assistants had a busy time in the city council chamber. Registering will continue tonight and tomorrow evening.

The questionnaire of registration includes conventional personal queries. It is asked if registrants are willing to serve if required, overseas, with militia in Canada, as home guards, special police, munitions workers or in any special work wherever called. Suggestions are also made as to special qualifications. The registrants are to large extent offering their services unconditionally.

The registrants are given a card certificate and in a few days buttons will be issued.
