PARIS FALLS

Gov't Moves NAZIS DRIVE

GERMANS LAUNCH FRONTAL ATTACK
ON MAGINOT LINE—ANSWER OF
ROOSEVELT AWAITED—ITAL-
IANS ATTACK

The army of Nazi Germany occupied the French capital of Paris during the night as the defence of France weakened from the sea to Montmedy, keystone of the Maginot Line, against which the Germans have commenced a mass frontal attack.

Although reaffirming its decision to fight to the end, abroad if necessary, the French government has withdrawn today from the provisional capital of Tours, presumably to the Bay of Biscay port of Bordeaux, far to the south.

The world anxiously awaits the answer of President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States to the final appeal of President Paul Reynaud who, in a speech last night, said he had sent his last call for help. Waves of planes from the United States would be necessary to stop the Nazis, said Reynaud, adding that "the soul of France is not beaten although the life of France is at stake."

President Roosevelt today said he had not yet received Premier Reynaud's appeal but declared that "everything possible is being done."

Great Britain reaffirmed her support of France and the resolve to fight on until "civilization is free of the nightmare of Nazism." All British resources will be thrown without reserve into the defense of France which one spokesman said was "the defence of Britain." British forces are now assisting in the defence of the port of Le Havre.

Italy is again reported today to have commenced invasion of the southeast of France. Continued fighting between Allied and Italian forces in North Africa is reported including further successful air raids by South African planes in Ethiopia.

TO ENLIST VETERANS

Reserve Companies To Be Attached To Militia Are Being Recruited

OTTAWA, June 14: (CP)—Recruiting of veterans' reserve companies to be attached to the militia will start as soon as organization can be completed, Hon. C. G. Power, acting minister of national defence, told the House of Commons yesterday. He said that recruiting of the veterans' home guard had been completed.

AFRICAN FIGHTING

South African Planes Hit Military Camps in Somaliland—R.A.F. Bombs Capruzz

PRETORIA, June 14: (CP)—Direct hits on Italian military camps in Kismayu district of Italian Somaliland were scored by South African planes yesterday.

The Royal Air Force bombed Italy's Fort Capruzz near the Egyptian border during flights over Libya, it was announced. Extensive damage was reported.

WILL BRING IN BUDGET

Change of Minister of Finance to Head of Defence Department Will Become Effective Next Week

OTTAWA, June 14: (CP)—Col. J. C. Ralston, as new minister of national defence, succeeds Hon. Norman Rogers who was killed in an airplane accident Monday and will continue as finance minister until after the budget is delivered next week. Meantime Hon. C. G. Power, minister of air, will continue to act as minister of defence.

The funeral of Mr. Rogers took place yesterday with Bishop G. A. Wells, chaplain general, and Rev. Stewart Iverson, Baptist Church pastor, officiating. Prime Minister King took part and read a message of resolve to fight the war to the finish which was found in Mr. Rogers' desk. Sailors, soldiers and airmen carried the body.

New Lithuanian- Russian Accord

KAUNAS, June 14: (CP)—Premier Merkys called the Lithuanian Parliament into extraordinary session yesterday to approve a new secret Soviet-Lithuanian accord.

TURK-NAZI PACT NOW

New Commercial Agreement Between Islam and Reich Has Been Signed, it is Announced

ANKARA, June 14: (CP)—The Turkish government awaits developments before making any definite move toward entering the war. Meantime the Turkish government has signed a new commercial treaty with Germany yesterday. It was announced that the accord provided for exchange of certain products to the extent of 21 million Turkish pounds. Turkey will send tobacco to Germany and receive machinery.

NO TRUST IN HITLER

President Roosevelt Does Not Forget Past Broken Promises of German Chancellor

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 14: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt repeated today that all possible help was being extended to the Allies and pointed to Adolf Hitler's record in response to a report that the German chancellor had said fears of invasion of the western hemisphere were grotesque. "It brings up recollections" was the comment of the President, undoubtedly referring to previous undertakings of Hitler in regard to extraterritorial policy.

PATTULLO WAR TALK

British Columbia Premier Says This Province Ready to Give Last Man and Last Dollar

MONTREAL, June 14: (CP)—Speaking from here last night, Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia declared that British Columbia was prepared to sacrifice its last man and its last dollar to win the war. He believed that was the feeling of all Canadians who were only too anxious to do their part as speedily as possible.

Now was no time for recriminations as to what had been or what had not been done. The stern reality was that a relentless and resourceful enemy had to be defeated. All Canadians felt it their duty to defeat the "gangsters and their atrocities."

The Premier also felt that, when this war was over, people of Canada would not be content to go along in the old way. First the war must be won. Later the spectre of insecurity must be removed and he thought Canada was in a position to do this.

"Our hand is on the trigger of justice and we are ready to go," declared Mr. Pattullo. "He is twice blest who has his cause just."

ITALIANS ARE BACK OF ALLIES

Local Colony Reaffirms its Solemn Allegiance to Canada—Disapproves Emphatically of Mussolini

Members of the Italian colony at Prince Rupert, those of Italian extraction as well as of Italian birth, the large majority of them Canadian citizens, gathered some sixty or seventy strong at the Catholic Hall last night and reaffirmed their allegiance and fealty to Canada and the British crown. A resolution of loyalty to the Allied cause in the present war included an emphatic denunciation of Mussolini and Hitler policies which had led to the present unfortunate conflict in the war against Great Britain and France. There was also a practical demonstration of the local Italian sentiment through the taking up of a collection amounting to \$123.90 for the Canadian Red Cross funds. The resolution passed by the meeting was as follows:

"We, the Canadians of Italian origin in Prince Rupert, wish to publicly state that we regret deeply the rupture of traditional friendship between Great Britain and her ally, France, and Italy."

"However, we came here many decades ago to carve out alongside our fellow Canadians for ourselves and our children a new homeland in this great Dominion and assumed, with our oath of allegiance, loyalty to the British crown. Therefore, our destinies are the one of this Dominion and the Allied cause."

"We beg to solemnly and firmly state that we have been and intend to remain true to our oath as loyal Canadian citizens."

"We emphatically denounce the Mussolini and Hitler policies." C. P. Balgano acted as chairman of the meeting and, after brief remarks expressing regret over the present international situation, called upon J. S. Wilson, secretary of the Canadian Legion, to address the meeting.

LONDON, June 14: (CP)—Hailed by a sentry when forced down in German territory, Pilot Officer Alexander MacLeod, 34, pretended not to hear, and sat on a riverbank to smoke a cigar. Satisfied he was a German, the sentries let him reach the British lines.

Great Britain To Put All Its Resources Without Reserve In Lightning Fight To Save France

Nazis Continue Their Drive Without Let-up Following Fall of Paris—Frenchmen Hard Pressed But Have Not Given Up

FRENCH FIGHTING BACK
TOURS, June 14: (CP)—The French army of Paris retreated tonight, counter-attacking as it went, while other forces were declared to have thrown back with heavy losses the Nazi frontal attack on the Maginot Line from the Saar district. The French High Command also announced that French warships had bombarded industrial establishments and railway lines along the Italian coast last night.

LONDON, June 14: (CP)—The plight of France has caused Great Britain to drop plans for a long war and go "all out" with its resources, sources close to the government said today. This releases a fund of money and credit for purchase in United States of anything which will convey or fire explosives. The fund had been originally allocated for future years. A new expeditionary force has been streaming into France the last several days, all equipped with new material.

PREVENT CAPTURE

Italian Steamship Malta Is Driven Ashore In Canary Islands

SANTA CRUZ DE TENERIFE, Canary Islands, June 14: (CP)—The crew of the Italian steamship Malta is reported to have driven the ship aground in the Canary Islands to escape a pursuing French warship.

HITLER'S PEACE OFFENSIVE
LONDON — Harold Nicolson, Parliament secretary of the Ministry of Information, predicted tonight that Hitler would soon—perhaps within the next few days—"launch his peace offensive."

AMBASSADOR IN CUSTODY?

WASHINGTON—Asked today if he had been advised of a report that United States Ambassador William C. Bullitt at Paris had been taken into protective custody, President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked why should he be taken into custody. It was Bullitt who last night sent first word to the outside in a message to the United States department of state that the "German army is inside the gates of Paris."

HUGE LOSS OF TONNAGE
LONDON—Authoritative sources said today that a total of 210,855 tons of Italian shipping had been captured by the Allies or scuttled by Italian crews since Italy entered the war at the first of the week.

ITALIAN SUBS ON RUN

CEUTA, Spanish Morocco—A damaged Italian submarine entered port today after cannonading was heard from the direction of Gibraltar. Earlier a pursued Italian submarine put into Algiers, Spain, seeking refuge while a second one is also reported to have sought haven in a Spanish port. Several Allied warships are patrolling the entrance of Ceuta Harbor.

SPAIN IS INVOLVED

Franco Troops Occupy International Zone of Tangier as "Safeguard Measure"

MADRID, June 14: (CP)—Spanish troops have occupied the international zone of Tangier in the name of the Sultan of Morocco to "safeguard independence and neutrality of the city," it was announced.

NAZI WAR SHIP HIT

Scharnhorst Bombed at Trondheim By British Plane—Armed Merchant Cruiser is Sunk

LONDON, June 14: (CP)—The Admiralty announced today that an airplane of the fleet arm had scored a hit with a heavy bomb on the German battleship Scharnhorst in Trondheim early Thursday.

It also announced that the armed merchant cruiser Scotstown had been sunk Thursday by a U-boat. Two officers and men are feared lost.

FOR HELP OF ALLIES

United States is Moving With End in View of Overcoming Neutrality Restrictions

NEW YORK, June 14: (CP)—Efforts to make it possible for United States ships to transport supplies to the Allies were reported today to be under way as definite steps were taken to amend the neutrality law as far as at least the Allies are concerned.

Under the neutrality act, as it stands at present, United States vessels are barred from belligerent waters but shipping executives are described as hopeful that some means of overcoming the restrictions may be devised.

INTEREST IN PEACE

Japan Also Alarmed Over Report That British Troops Have Landed in Netherlands East Indies

TOKYO, June 14: (CP)—In demanding that all forces of belligerent nations be removed from China, the Japanese-controlled regime in China said it was interested only in avoiding "untoward incidents," pointing out that Great Britain, France and Italy all have forces in China.

Meantime the Japanese Foreign Office in Tokyo said it regarded with "extreme gravity" a report published in the newspaper Nichi Nichi alleging that two thousand British troops had been landed in the Dutch East Indies after the Island requested protection. (The Netherlands government has denied report of British troops landing in Dutch East Indies.)
