SOLDIERS' VOTE

That is possibly because the soldiers were affected by such things as delays in receiving uniforms, delay in settling allowances and such like. At any rate the vote has had little effect on the general result. We can now feel that the election results are settled.

ARMY FOR HANSON

While the army generally gave a majority for the Conservatives, in Skeena the vote was strong for Olof Hanson. That was probably a personal vote for the Liberal member elect for he is popular with all classes of people. The vote is just another sign of his popularity and also an indication of his solidarity with the troops and with their aims and objects.

BUY BRITISH

The first indication of a "Buy British" campaign was given at the Chamber of Commerce meeting this week when a letter came from the Toronto Board of Trade drawing attention to the need of such a move in order to help in financing the war. Every dollar spent in buying British goods gives Britain a credit in this country. Not only that, it also gives Canadians an opportunity of selling another dollar's worth of goods in England. It helps in two different ways.

Very soon we expect to see a determined campaign to influence people to buy British goods, this being in the best interests of the country and the Empire.
