Supporting the Churches . . .

In these times when war sentiment runs high the churches are apt to feel the pinch as a result of the diversion of funds to Red Cross and other purposes. The United Church has sensed this and recommends that members of that organization purchase war savings stamps or certificates and donate them to the Church.

What applies to the United Church might well apply to all the churches. War Savings Certificates could be used by the Churches as a basis for credit or in other ways and the donation would at the same time satisfy the patriotic aspirations of the people. The churches must be kept going and this is one way of doing it.

Happy as Never Before . . .

Now and then we read something that reminds us of our neglect. Of late we have been thinking so much of the soldiers, the sailors, the airmen and the children evacuees that we have almost forgotten what women are doing. Yesterday we drew attention to a phase of women's work and again today from Overseas we are glad to pass on to all our readers something more:

"Women have been doing grand things up and down the country from arresting German parachutists single-handed to darning soldier's socks. A woman doctor with the rank of Major has recently been appointed to the Army, the first woman to hold such a position. Another, a woman corporal in the W.A.A.F., dragged a pilot from his blazing plane and shielded him from a bomb, and thousands are working all day and every day in the week in munition factories and doing it with a right good will. We can't let down all the nations depending on us for their freedom. It's unthinkable. And we are happy as we never have been before. Nothing is so stimulating as a crusade and today we are all crusaders—every one of us. Nothing that can be done by the most iniquitous group of criminals the world has ever seen can keep back the dawn of a new and better and more Christian world."

Inspired by Heroes . . .

Back again to our soldier heroes, let us quote:

"The Lancastria was sinking: hundreds were in the water, but the soldiers on board remained until the end. They were seen clinging as best they could to the side of the ship as she disappeared and could be heard singing together 'There'll always be an England.' How easy it is to read these words in cold print. But try to picture what it must be to face drowning suddenly, with no time to make any preparations, no time to write any last words, no time almost to think, and yet facing a horrible death, facing the unknown, and to be able to sing 'There'll Always be an England.' Thank God there will always be an England, but it must be a nobler and better England in the future, inspired by such simple heroes as these who are daily enriching our traditions."
