LONDON, March 16: (CP)- The Admiralty announced today that the naval trawler Peridot had struck a German mine and sunk without loss of life. The British freighter Melrose, 1589 tons, is also reported sunk after an explosion following striking a mine, eighteen of the crew being missing.
