Whifflets From The Waterfront

Arriving in port at 10 o'clock this morning from the south, C.N.R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, is inaugurating the company's schedule of fall sailings, calling for a weekly service between Prince Rupert and Vancouver via Powell River and Ocean Falls. The Prince George will sail at 3 p.m. for Ketchikan and Stewart and is due back here at 8 o'clock Thursday evening, sailing at 11:30 p.m. for the south. This Friday the Prince Rupert, which sailed on Monday afternoon for the south, will be back here from Vancouver and will lay over here until Thursday night of next week when she will go on the run in place of the Prince George which will be withdrawn from service here for the winter.

Making a special run north with an overflow of passengers who ordinarily would have come north on the Catala had she had room to accommodate all, Union steamer Cassiar, Capt. Alex McLennan, arrived here at 5 o'clock yesterday morning from the south and sailed at 8:30 a.m. on her return to Vancouver via Claxton, Butedale, Namu and Taltheo at each of which points she will load canned salmon.
