HOPE FOR HIGHWAY

SMITHERS, Sept. 4.—Hope has been renewed in the district that with the sudden realization in the United States of the great need of immediate connection with Alaska to provide for the proper means of defence of that outlying portion of the country and also in view of the new arrangement for joint measures of defence between that country and Canada, the Alaska highway will be one of the first projects considered by the joint commission in this connection.

With all the data for the highway now in the hands of the two governments a great deal of the preliminary work has already been completed and it should not take very long to get action in the matter if it is decided to go ahead with the project.

The Hazelton route being the very shortest route that can now be selected and with the added and greatest advantage being the fact that it will be much closer to the Alaska towns and seaports than any other route, thereby giving quicker and easier access to the highway from these places, while the main highway itself will be well protected from hostile attack, sheltered by the Coast range of mountains, it would seem logical and most feasible that the Hazelton route would be the route chosen for this highway when and if it is decided to proceed with its construction.

NORTH IN ORE SHOW

District Well Represented At Vancouver—Omineca Has Best Collection

SMITHERS, Sept. 4.—Mining properties of the north were well represented among the prize winners at the Canadian Pacific Exhibition in Vancouver last week, a number of northern properties carrying off the first prize in their classes.

The Hunter Basin property, about 20 miles from Smithers, was awarded first prize for copper gold ore. This property is under option by the Con West people and is under the supervision of Mr. Tomlinson M.E.

The Silver Pick property on Babine Mountain near Smithers was given first prize in the silver-lead class. This property is owned by Mrs. Martin Kean and associates of Vancouver and is under option to Vancouver interests. Work is being carried out by a small crew under direction of Mr. Agnew M. E. who is in Smithers at the present time.

Tommy Turner Sr. of Terrace, the well known old timer and prospector of that place, received first prize money in the gold-silver-lead class from his property near Terrace while Hagen and Clore of Copper City got a second prize for gold ore.

In addition to the individual awards, the first prize for the best collection of ore from any one mining division went to the Omineca mining division.

These ore samples will be put on permanent display in the British Columbia Chamber of Mines in Vancouver and should result in some first class advertising for the mineral resources of the north.

Frank E. Woodside, manager of the British Columbia Chamber of Mines in Vancouver has always been a consistent booster for the north and takes every opportunity of bringing to the notice of the mining fraternity the resources of Northern British Columbia.

Much credit also must be given to Dr. J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer of Prince Rupert, who has done so much to advise and encourage the prospectors and property holders throughout this district in his frequent visits to their properties. His assistance has been greatly appreciated and has meant money in their pockets in a great many instances.

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DEVELOP PROPERTY

Hunter Basin Mine Near Smithers To Be Equipped With Machinery

SMITHERS, Sept. 4.—The development work being carried out on the Hunter Basin mining property by the Conwest people has proven very satisfactory and it has been decided to equip the property with machinery.

In order to get the machinery to the property it will be necessary to construct eight and a half miles of road and a contract has been let to a Penticton firm for this work. It is expected to have construction under way immediately and to be completed in a few weeks. The road will start at the Dockrill coal mine and follow an easy grade to the property.

When this road has been completed it is likely that an increased number of men will be taken on and that development work will proceed much faster than it has been doing by hand.

DUTHIE IS OPERATING

Thirteen Men Working at Smithers Property—Regular Shipments Being Made

SMITHERS, Sept. 4.—A crew of thirteen men is now employed at the Duthie mine near Smithers by Messrs. Kelley and Herman who have this property leased. Carloads of ore are being shipped out at frequent intervals and the results have been very satisfactory despite the extremely low price of silver and lead which are the principal ores being mined there.

A school is being established at the property again this year to take care of the children now living at the mine. It is the first school there in the past 10 years.

VANDERHOOF

The agricultural committee of the Vanderhoof and District Board of Trade has just completed a farm census of the Nechako Valley. It shows that land cleared in the area totals 11,916 acres with 624½ acres in wheat, 3,225 acres in oats, 162½ acres in barley and 3,271 acres in hay and feed. The livestock census shows the farmers of the Nechako district to own 1688 head of cattle, 352 hogs and 919 sheep. The immediate vicinity of Vanderhoof shows by far the greatest development although the census also included the Lakes, Mapes, Chilco, Hulatt, Engen and Stuart River districts. It is planned in future to take such a census annually.

The site is being cleared for a new skating rink at Vanderhoof. Building material has been purchased and commencement on the structure is to be made in the near future.

The Gillespie Grain Co. has received a carload of salt for the Vanderhoof elevator.

Major R. L. Gele, recruiting officer for the district, Lieut. Scott, medical officer, and Sergeant E. J. Newman were visitors in Vanderhoof last week on official duties.

Paul Boor arrived at Vanderhoof from Mandon, North Dakota, to take charge of harvesting operations on his farm.

Walter L. Hornsby, formerly manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Prince George and now retired, was a visitor in the Vanderhoof district last week.

A meeting of the Vanderhoof United Church choir was held last Thursday evening. Practices for the winter will be resumed this Thursday evening. Both the Anglican and United Churches are resuming activities for the season here.

Miss Jean I. McGeachy is here from Vancouver visiting with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. McGeachy.

There has been a good deal of rainfall in the Nechako Valley during the past week with showers of more or less weight on five successive days. It is also getting cooler and, like the rest of the central interior, there is a distinct feeling of fall in the air.
