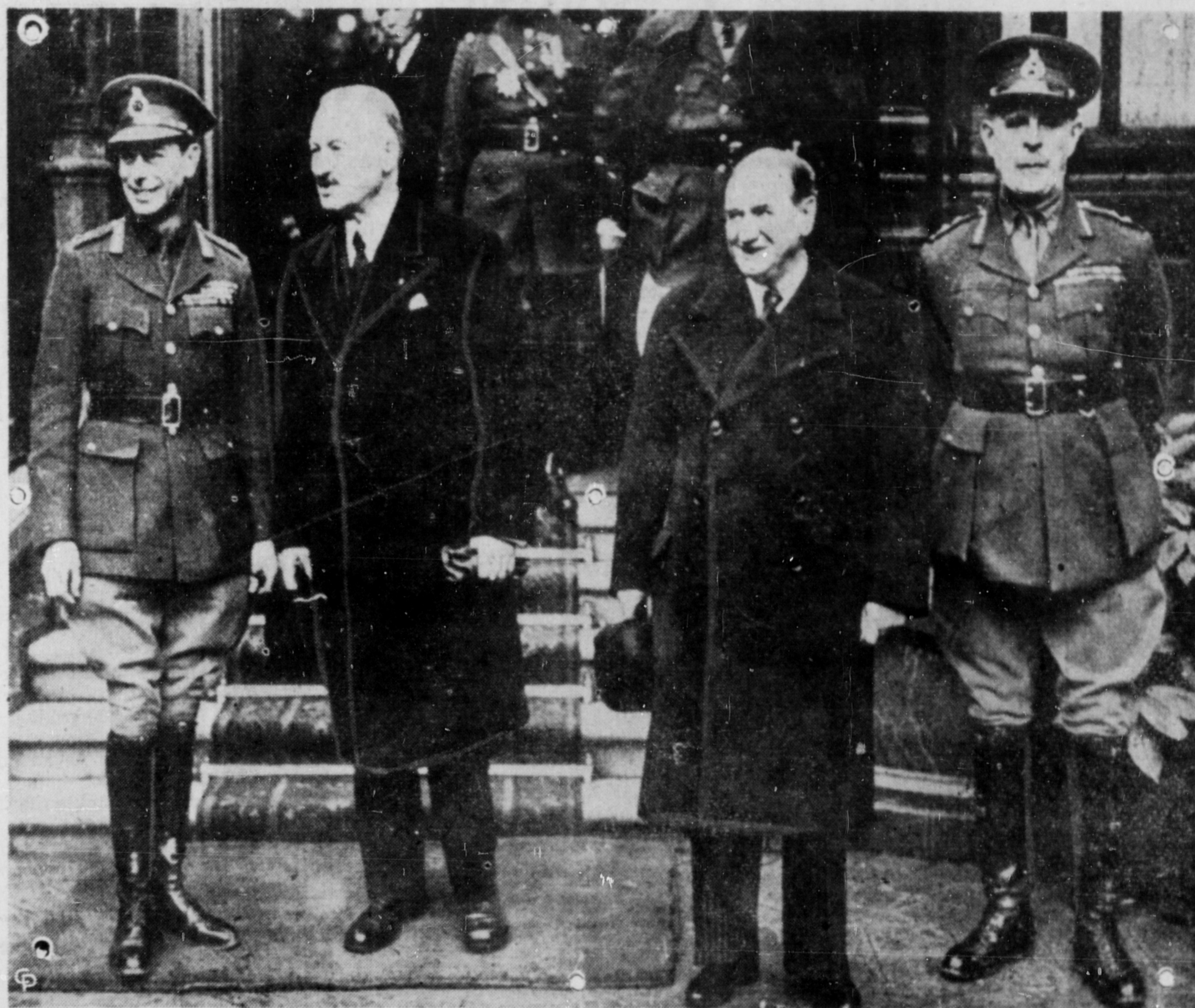

### Elevator Near Full

Storage Bins Are Bulging And That Now Arriving Goes Into Workhouse

The local elevator is now about four-fifth or more filled with some one million bushels of grain as a result of shipments which have been moving in from the prairies since fall. Some five hundred cars have been received and about one hundred more will fill the house up completely. There were fifteen more cars on the track this morning, having arrived over the weekend. The storage bins of the elevator are full and grain now arriving goes into the workhouse.

There is no word yet as to when exporting of grain from here may be expected to start. This is affected by world shipping conditions and the shortage of boats.

### Whifflets From The Waterfront

The Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association was in session at the Canadian Legion rooms yesterday afternoon under the chairmanship of the President, J. M. Morrison, and with seventeen or eighteen members in attendance. There was a general discussion of control measures for the coming season, no definite decisions being reached at this time.

Provincial police cruiser P. M. L. 8, with Inspector C. G. Barber on board, returned to port last night from a patrol trip to Hartley Bay, Lowe Inlet and Butedale. Departure had been made Friday morning.

Tenders on war shipbuilding were to have been closed at O-tawa on January 4 but the time has been extended until January 11. The Prince Rupert dry dock is among British Columbia shipbuilding yards which have tendered.

On account of heavy increase in rail and shipping rates as well as insurance due to war conditions, frozen fish shipments from the Pacific Coast to the United Kingdom and Europe have practically ceased, it is stated locally. The cost of shipping has increased from 3 1/2 to 10c. The foreign exchange situation is another factor operating against Pacific Coast frozen fish.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, was late in arriving last night from the south, not getting in until midnight. She sailed at 2 a.m. for Stewart and other northern points whence she will be back here tomorrow afternoon southbound.

Effective January 15, the wave length of Union steamers' radio broadcasts of arrival times will be changed from 540 to 1630 kilocycles. The broadcast will continue to be heard at the same times as at present.
