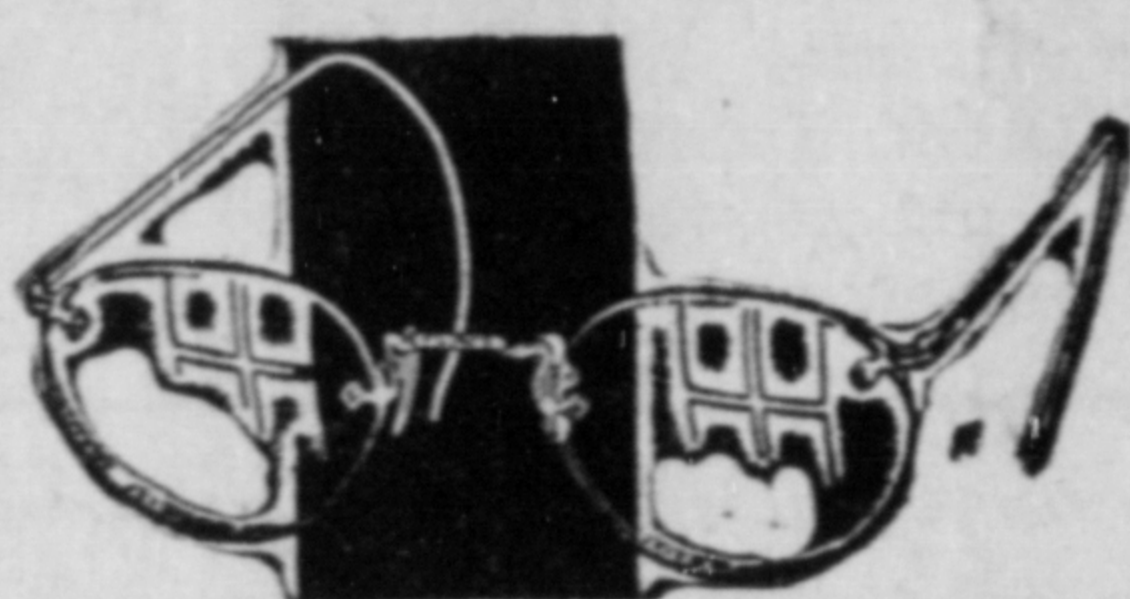

INDIANS IN LEAD

But Their Margin Over Detroit
Tigers in Close American League
Finish is Only One Percentage

CLEVELAND, Sept. 9: (CP)—
Cleveland Indians stayed in the
leadership of the American League
by one percentage point yesterday
as a result of a close 5 to 4 victory
over Chicago White Sox with the
second place Detroit Tigers and
third place New York Yankees
keeping pace in a hectic finish of
the 1940 pennant race with victories
over St. Louis Browns and Boston
Red Sox respectively. The contest
seems now pretty well centred be-
tween these three clubs.

In the National League the Cin-
cinnati dropped a three to one de-
cision to Chicago Cubs yesterday
but still have a margin of leader-
ship of six full games over the run-
ner-up Brooklyn Dodgers who won
a double-header over New York
Giants. The Pittsburgh Pirates, who
have displaced St. Louis Cardinals
from third place, won twice from
the Red Birds.

Whifflets From The Waterfront

The Department of Transport an-
nounces that the day beacon, on Re-
gatta Rock, Seaforth Channel, has
been re-established.

In the course of a tour of com-
pany salmon canning operations in
the district, J. M. Buchanan, gen-
eral manager of B.C. Packers, was
a week-end visitor in the city, ar-
riving Saturday on the Camosun
from the Queen Charlotte Islands.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise,
Capt. S. K. Gray, is expected in
port late tonight or early tomor-
row morning from Vancouver en-
route to Skagway. The vessel was
scheduled to be here this morning
but has been delayed through
having made a special run north
from Vancouver to Klemtu at the
end of last week to pick up pas-
sengers from the steamer Princess
Charlotte which had become dis-
abled after a stranding.

Delayed again by heavy traffic
for intermediate points, Union
steamer Catala, Capt. James Find-
lay, arrived in port at 1:15 this
morning from the south and sailed
at 5:30 a.m. for Stewart and other
northern points whence she is due
back here tomorrow afternoon
southbound.

Sounds Jargon But Means Well

Ordinary Folk Are Let In On Some
R. A. F. Orderly Room Talk

LONDON, Sept. 9: (CP)— Life
in squadrons of the Royal Air
Force revolves around the orderly
room, hub of every unit organiza-
tion. Phrases, which sound like
jargon to the layman but make
sense to the airmen who use them,
are bandied about.

"A bunch of things for P. O.
R's," says the orderly room ser-
geant in a scene typical of any
orderly room any morning. He
hands a pile of papers to a lead-
aircraftsman.

Then he tells the corporal the
adjutant wants to see him about
some stuff for D. R. O.'s and asks
where the "Docs" clerk has got
to.

Translated, it all makes sense.
One man in the office deals with
P. O. R's—Personal Occurrence
Reports. On these depend an air-
man's pay and rations. Entries are
made on all casualties, postings,
attachments, allowances of next of
kin and other "occurrences."

D. R. O. means daily routine or-
ders, published over the signature
of the commanding officer or ad-
jutant.

The "Docs" clerk has to keep up
to date a set of personal docu-
ments dealing with each airman.
Every time an airman is moved
the documents must follow him.
