In all 560,898 persons were admitted to the various theatres and the total proceeds of the event amounted to \$718,014.35, which was the total amount received. Of this amount Nova Scotia contributed \$60,396.25; New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island together \$31,816.90; Quebec \$77,234.25; Ontario \$341,996.70; Manitoba and part of Saskatchewan \$82,561.25; Alberta and part of Saskatchewan \$87,096.75; British Columbia \$50,910.25.

MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT TELLS ABOUT AIR RAIDS

of our operations both in defence and attack it comes to 141 aircraft against the Nazi 570, with the loss of 186 personnel against the Nazi 1400. One to four in machines, 1 to 7½ in men. These are the figures as the Air Ministry presents them to the press. And on one side they are complete, correct and final. Our losses are of course, all known and they are given in full. They are given in full for various reasons. But not least because to hide or understate them would demoralize our pilots and their courage as nothing else could do. Faked official optimism is a most foolish form of Dutch courage and with a fighting force it brings swift retribution in its tracks.

But it is not so certain that our Air Ministry gives the Nazi losses quite so fully. Indeed, it is not possible to know for certain what they are. With modern aircraft the aerial dogfights are so swift and sudden that the turmoil of scores of simultaneous combat is so great that not even the most experienced pilots can always be certain when his enemy has been destroyed. No victory is counted unless the pilot is quite certain and unless the evidence has been checked and counter-checked. Thus it is absolutely certain that there are many Germans who are not counted but who never reach home. And our Air Command makes no allowance for them of any kind. Of course in all estimates of fighting it is right to leave a liberal margin for mistakes. That margin has been left, if only on one side of the ledger. It is a margin far wider than truth.

I am fortified in this conviction by three stories told me by air officers who were themselves concerned and who have been my personal friends for many years.

The first is of a Spitfire squadron which met something over 30 German bombers on our eastern coast. The Germans had either come without their protecting fighters, or had lost them on the way, and in 40 minutes the Spitfires had shot down 22 and driven away the rest and had done so without the loss of a machine or of a man.

The second story is of a flight of Hurricanes, six machines, which met the biggest force of German bombers they had ever seen. They said there were at least 120 of them. More than they had ever seen to-

claims — German fighters, like swarms of gnats above the streets of London—our airdromes in ruins —our ports out of action—our factories in flames. Two impartial transatlantic witnesses, Helen Kirkpatrick and Virginia Cole, whose experience and feminine integrity is their sufficient passport in many lands, toured our south coast here on Friday. Neither saw serious damage of any kind. Helen Kirkpatrick told me today that at Dover she saw eight Nazis crash before her eyes. But she saw no damage to the keys or harbor. She saw one shell hole in a private house.

The attack of our bombers in Germany is a very different affair. That is proved by every report, whether from pilots, neutrals or other sources, which is received. Proved by our aerial photography, photographs which we have made. It is proved by the mass movements of German civilians from the Ruhr district. Proved by Goering's recent announcements of fundamental changes in his A.R.P.

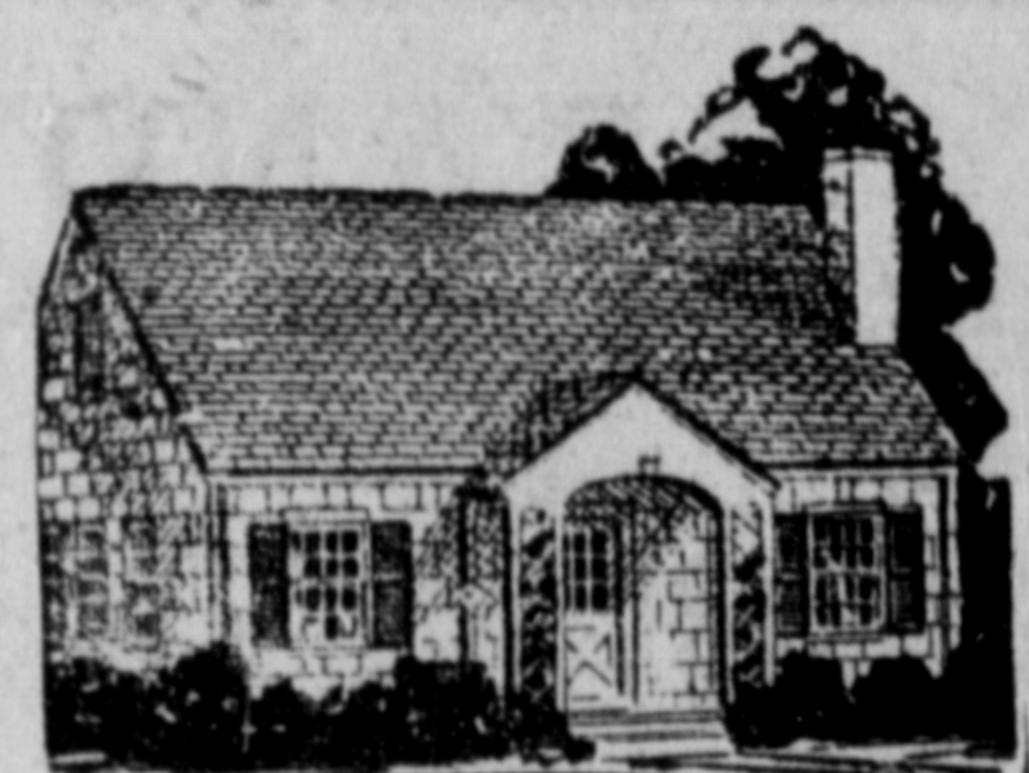
