MAY HAVE BEEN 23 DOWNED LONDON, July 29: (CP)-Early unofficial reports placed at twenty-three the number of German planes shot down in today's battle off the southeast coast of England. Officially it was indicated that the total would probably run higher than fifteen which an official statement gave out based on "reports so far received."
