

Home Pig Clubs For More Bacon

Britons Getting More Hog Conscious in Wartime Providing

LONDON, May 7: (CP)— With more than 800 pig clubs formed in less than a year, Britons are rapidly becoming more pig-conscious. than ever before.

Alex Hobson, secretary of the Small Pig Keeper's Council, estimated these clubs would provide about 30,000 pigs annually or 1,500 tons of bacon.

Backyards, allotments, factory grounds, sports grounds, A.F.S. stations and village schools all have: their pigs. In London there are clubs at the zoo and in Hyde Park.

"Pig clum members feed their animals on househild and garden waste," said Hobson, "but they are allowed a certain amount of meal through arrangements with the Ministry of Food."

Club members may keep four pigs each. They may two them-; selves but the other two must be sold to the Ministry of Food.
