Great Britain And United States Planning Express Convoys Across Atlantic

LONDON, May 3: (CP)—Britain and the United States were said reliably today to be easing the pressure on Eire for bases and are concentrating on a new plan of express convoys to win the Battle of Britain.

An authoritative American source described the British position at the moment as "pretty grim" and added that the need for quick aid is so urgent that, even if Eire decided to turn over bases, the machinery might be so cumbersome they would be of little immediate advantage.

The greatest need is the swift institution of a new convoy system under close co-operation of the British and United States navies.
