WINTER EXERCISE Ball Players Will be Better Off Out of Doors

"There is nothing like outdoor exercise during the winter time to put a baseball player in proper condition," remarked George McBride, the crack baseman of the Washington club in the American League during a fanning bee.

"It may sound strange," continued the Washington captain, "but this talk during the last few weeks of independent leagues bring to mind the Fletcher deal of a year or so ago? There were many of the star players in both the big leagues who were ready to go over to when they were offered big bonuses to those who signed a contract by the Fletcher people, and a most flattering one, but, of course, nothing ever came of it. It seems to me that the major leagues are adopting a very wise course in the proposed extension of the American Association into cities like Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, for with continuous ball there it will make it much harder for the leagues to get a footing. In my opinion, the players will be slow to accept anything of that kind as long as the major-league magnates treat them fairly, and I guess most of them are doing that now."

Against High Speeding. Believing that high-speed motor-car racing no longer serves a useful purpose, besides bringing discredit upon motoring, and the motor-car trade, Benjamin Briscoe, president of the United States Motor Company, has prepared a letter to the American Automobile Association advising that it abandon the control of speed contests and devote its time to the promotion and encouragement of touring and reliability contests and particularly furthering its work for good roads, a work which the national organization has done with excellent results during the past five years.

The Court of Golf. The Royal Montreal Golf Club's expenditure last year was \$11,234. Green usages and upkeep of links cost \$4,429. President J. P. McCall, who is also President of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, was re-elected at the annual meeting. The Canadian championships will be held on the club's links this year.

COMFORT FOR AIRMEN H. B. Wild Tells of Wonders He saw At Paris Exhibition.

Absolute comfort for both pilots and passengers is being provided for by the leading aeroplane designers abroad. Horace B. Wild, of the Aero Club of Illinois, recently returned from a visit to Europe, has a lot of interesting things to tell of what he saw at the Aero Show in Paris. One three-passenger monoplane at the show had elaborately upholstered seats with arm rests, foot-warmers, whose heat was received from the exhaust, and speaking-tubes for communication between passengers and driver. In another monoplane the driver was covered all but his head with a thin water-proof hood, fastened to the edges of the cockpit with easily released glove clasps. Mr. Wild says Italy sent a great many more aeroplanes out to the seat of war in Tripoli than was publicly admitted. With his own eyes the Chicago aeronaut saw three carloads of flying machines being shipped to the front. He knows eighteen Niropots were purchased for the Italian army, and from what he afterward heard at the Bleriot works, is convinced that at least sixty monoplanes and biplanes are now available for the Italian forces in Africa.
