We like the verbal display put on in the House of Commons Tuesday by Joe Harris, member of the House of Commons for Toronto. He was appealing to Prime Minister Mackenzie King for leadership or to step aside and hand over the job to someone else.

Hon. Arthur Meighen . . .

On a former occasion we have expressed the opinion that it would be a tactical mistake to make Hon. Arthur Meighen or any other old man leader of the Conservative party. Now he is chosen and if the idea is to look forward to forming of a national government in the near future it was the best possible move.

Secret of Success . . .

According to a former United States ambassador to Russia the secret of the success of the Russians in defending their country against the Nazis lies very largely in the bloody purges when many of the army leaders and politicians were convicted of traitorous negotiations with Germany and Japan.

This Fifth Column was very widespread and when its leaders were liquidated most people seemed to think it was another case of Russian barbarism. During their trials, most of which were held in public and were attended by the consular representatives of many countries, the convicted men admitted that they had agreed to accept the leadership of Trotsky in plans to assassinate Stalin, that there was to be a military uprising, with sabotaging of industries, military information was passed on to Germany and Japan who were to back up the rebels in their efforts to change the administration.

After the house-cleaning one of the Russian leaders is reported to have remarked: "It is easier for a burglar to break into a house if he has an accomplice to let him in. We have taken care of the accomplices." Today Russia has no saboteurs, secret agents or fifth columnists to co-operate with the invaders.

Two Churchills . . .

Prime Minister Winston Churchill is doing much to implement the hope of Anglo-American unity voiced in 1899 by another and earlier Winston Churchill. An author named Winston Churchill, in the book "Richard Carvell," discussed early difficulties between England and the United States and said, "I pray God that time may soften the bitterness caused . . . and that the Stars and Stripes and Union Jack may one day float together to cleanse this world of tyranny."
