**DOGFISH
LIVERS UP
KETCHIKAN**

Article in Chronicle Says Price Reached 30½ Cents Wednesday

How much is dogfish liver worth? The November 5 edition of the Ketchikan Chronicle has the following article in regard to the demand there:

How much was dogfish liver worth? That was the question local fishermen gleefully speculated upon today as bidding on the rapid's approximate 2100 pounds, which started Monday, sun continued. By early afternoon the latest bid was 30½ cents a pound. Gilmore Rolie, representing Lawes Products, made the bid. The one buyer, C. L. Cloudy, representing Washington laboratories, was awaiting a wire from George Burdard, director of the firm, advising him whether or not to raise the bid.

More than a week ago Mr. Burdard, in announcing establishment of a vitamin oil plant here in partnership with Salmon By Products corporation, gave an opening price of 12 cents a pound. This summer buyers were paying 5 and 6 cents a pound.

But when the Rapid showed up Monday with its liver, Lawes Products, represented by Mr. Rolie, also was in the field. His concern has machinery for Ketchikan on the way, with which to start production of vitamin oils in the near future.

Since Monday, Pete Baade, skipper of the Rapid, has watched with pleasure the value of his trip steadily rise. When it reached 20 cents Monday afternoon Rolie would his firm as to whether or not he should go higher.

With pauses to await wires from their respective firms, the buyers have been bidding off and on ever since.

Whether or not the end is near was not even known by the buyers this afternoon. In Seattle dogfish liver over the week-end was bringing as much as 40 cents. Alaskan dogfish, however, are not supposed to be worth as much, since it is believed their livers do not yield oil with as high a vitamin potency as oil from dogfish caught in the south.

The local buyers may be trying to find out just how much their firms are willing to pay, it is believed.

Captain Baade and Hans Olsen, who fished with him on the Rapid are not the only local fishermen watching their catch rise in value. The Sentinel, skippered by L. P. Sunderland, delivered about 650 pounds of dogfish liver Monday to Alaska Fish Products with the understanding that the Sentinel will receive the market price—when-ever that is determined.

The Rapid is unloading its dogfish trip this afternoon so it can be kept in cold storage, although the ultimate buyer is still undetermined.

Two black cod trips sold yesterday afternoon. The Delight sold 10,000 pounds to the New England Fish Company and the Balder sold 14,000 to Alaska Fish Products, both at 7 cents a pound.
