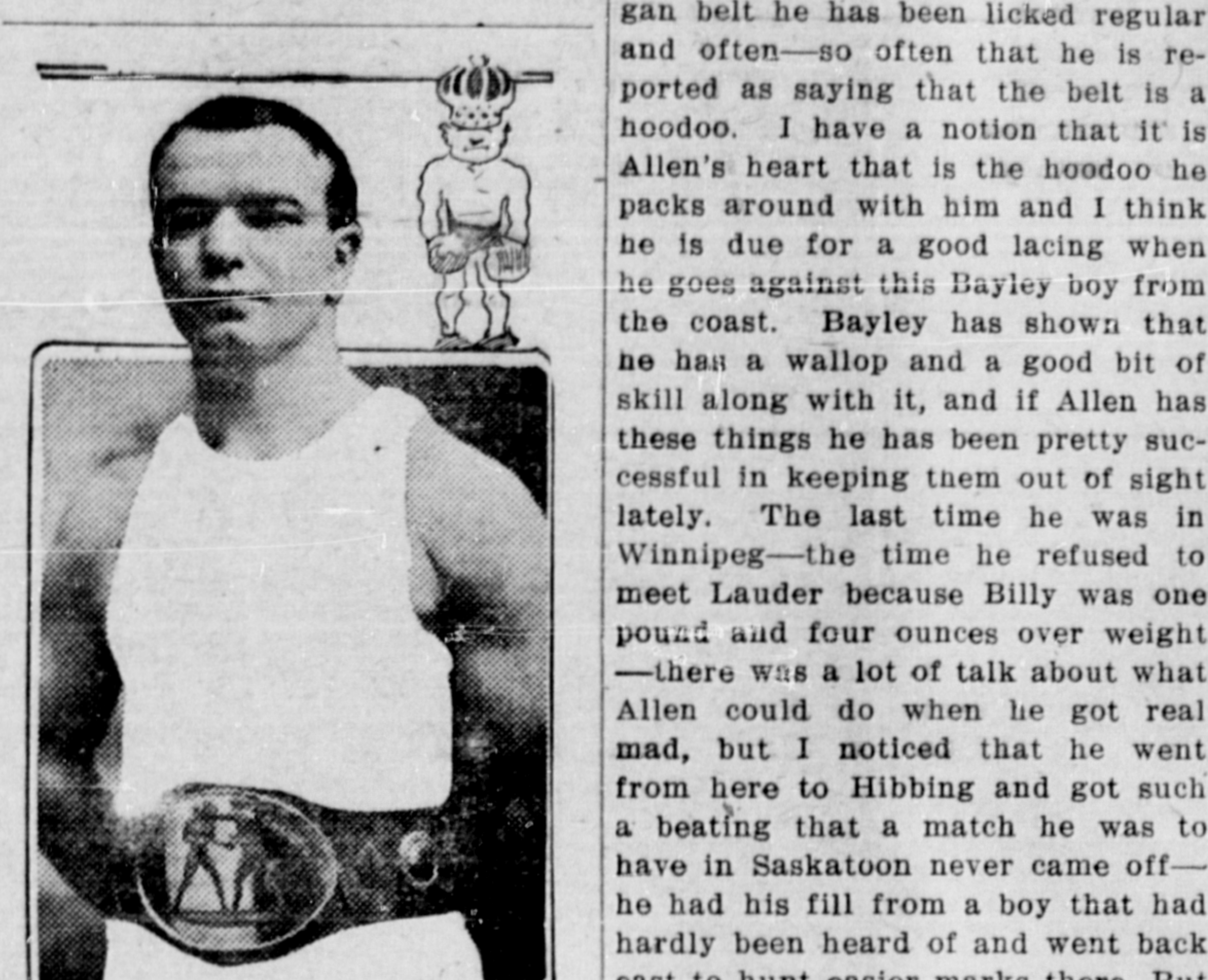
JOE BAYLEY VS. BILLY ALLEN

have to box him before this date,
as Jack says all the money in the

change his plans.

"If any of the 'hopes' want to meet
me they will have to get ready in a
hurry," Johnson said. "I am will-
ing to take on all of them and all
the time I want between bouts is
one week. I realize I am getting

old, and I do not want to go the
route of the other champions. I can
beat all the Palzers, Morrissses,
Flynnss, Wells and Smiths in the
game, and as long as there is no
one able to give me a battle, I may
just as well retire with the title be-
fore I get too old to defend it suc-
cessfully.

"I made up my mind to quit about
a week ago. I have made and saved
enough money to keep me the rest
of my life and my retirement will
not be that of a black Patti. When
the clock strikes 12 at midnight on
Labor Day Jack Johnson will be
