and the secretary told him that quite an elaborate investigation had been made, plans and blue prints prepared for the bridge, and sent to the Minister of Public Works at Victoria.

Organization and Officers

Motions were then put and carried for the appointment of Committees on Organization, and on Ways and Means. The first named committee was swiftly appointed. It consisted of J. H. Hilditch, W. D. Vance and Lee Baker. The committee retired for a few minutes, considered their problem and reported at the meeting in session as follows:

That the organization be titled "The West End Property Owners' Association." That membership fee be one dollar a year. That a roll be prepared with names of members, and that permanent officers, a president and secretary be appointed.

Lee Baker was by show of hands appointed President, and Mr. Bainter, of Bainter, & Sloan, was appointed secretary-treasurer.

Ex-officio these two are members of the Ways and Means committee, the other members of which appointed by Chairman Peck before he relinquished the chair to President Lee Baker, being W. Lynch, J. G. Scott, Mr. Ferguson, R. A. McMordie and Ald. G. Kerr.

There followed some further discussion, the features of which were Jack Hilditch's determined advocacy of the straight frontage tax system, which was applauded, and M. J. McNeill's indefatigable persistency on the bridge question, but the meeting speedily adjourned and dispersed on the recommendation of J. H. Hilditch that they should meet again next Wednesday to hear the report of the Ways and Means committee.
