The sessions opened this morning and are continuing this afternoon. The salmon canners' operating committee which arrived on the Prince George this morning from Vancouver and will sail tonight by the Princess Adelaide on its return south, consists of Samuel Murray, assistant general manager of B. C. Packers, chairman; Richard Nelson of Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd., H. D. Lord of Anglo-British Columbia Packers, and George R. Clark of Canadian Fishing Co. with F. E. Payson, secretary.

With a fair-sized list of passengers and considerable freight cargo, C.N.R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at 8:15 this morning from Vancouver and Ocean Falls and sailed at noon for Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow morning and sail at 4 p.m. on her return south. The Prince George is now operating on summer schedule and will be here next Wednesday going north on her first Alaska voyage.

The Department of Transport announces that an uncharted rock at Port Louis, Tingley Cove near the southeastern end of Pip Islets on the Queen Charlotte Islands has been reported by naval patrol boats of the Department of National Defence. It is awash at low water. Shoal water has also been found to extend across this channel and for vessels entering Tingley Cove the west channel is recommended but care should be exercised especially at low water, as rock bottom has been found in different parts of this channel. Breakers are reported at Athlow Bay about a mile and a half from the north extreme of Louis Point. An uncharted rock is also reported in Skincuttle Inlet near Copper Island light, it being awash at low water.
