Y. M. C. A. Advises Nothing a month for diversion, debt or doctors is the way the of these all-acrosscountry daughters of Canada have solved the problem according to Miss E. M. Tyhurst, general secretary for the Y. W. C. A. who has dealt with hundreds of them in the past 15 months.

"Except for exceptional cases the girls must pay \$35 a month for room and board or else pay for it in poor health and diminished resistance to illness," she said.

Miss Tyhurst worries most about! how the girls spend their time after working hours and what they do when they are ill.

The majority of the girls working as Grade 1 clerks are high school graduates. Some have university degrees.
