Regular mails have done much to make the garrison's lot happier one, and a daily news sheet appears.

Australia's first V.C. winner was hero of Toruk—Corporal J. H. Edmondson, a young farmer from Liverpool, New South Wales.

It is both a military and an industrial problem of the first magnitude. Two years ago the establishment of such a division would not have been a practical project, because Australia had not then reached a sufficiently advanced stage of industrial development.

Today the project is taking a tangible shape, and training is being speeded up to make the division ready for service overseas.

The scheme will probably cost Australia considerably more than the original estimate of \$172,250,000. Already the Australian estimate of expenditure for the scheme is \$195,000,000.

Has A Wonderful Husband Who Doesn't Mind Her Wrestling—She Mostly Wins

When she climbs into the ring a lot of other lady wrestlers would just as soon climb out. During her brief career she has won every match except two—one a loss and the other a draw.

Grace has liquid, Latin eyes, big, broad-shouldered, she says. "And he doesn't mind my wrestling—says he's proud of me. I keep house for him—do all the work in our four-room apartment. I wish you could see my parlor. I'm so proud of it. My kitchen is beautiful, too—all in blue. I cook and scrub in the mornings—and train in the afternoon. I hope to go on wrestling for a long time."

For all her wrestling, Grace doesn't look masculine. She shows a touch of the tomboy still, but she isn't mannish. Feminine? Yes. Not the femininity of frills, but of warmth, friendliness, gentleness—and steely courage when the going is rough. She has a big full-bosomed figure, curly black hair, a soft voice, a quick friendly smile.
