PAPER AS SABOTEUR

Hon. C. D. Howe Makes Charges Against Financial Post During Statement On War Industry Production

OTTAWA, Feb. 27:—In the course of a speech in Parliament yesterday in which he declared that the aircraft and armaments industry of Canada were being disturbed by unique and unwarranted criticism for war purposes, Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of munitions and supply, described the Financial Post, Toronto financial journal, as being the "No. 1 Saboteur of Canada." When one paper paid money to buy space in other papers to make damaging statements it was not doing it for charity, the minister declared. He charged the campaigning of the Financial Post was disturbing war industries.

The minister gave a detailed account of the progress of aircraft and munitions production, stating that some was actually ahead of schedule.

Mr. Howe replied to charges of Mayor J. W. Cornett of Vancouver who had declared that British Columbia plants were not being used to full capacity and that plants, particularly on the lower mainland, were capable of more activity, particularly in shipbuilding. Percy Bengough of the Vancouver Trades and Labor Council has agreed that plants on the west coast are not being used to full capacity and that there is no scarcity of men. Mr. Howe said that information gained on the basis of a survey was being used.

The minister denied that he and H. R. MacMillan had quarrelled.
