### Monthly Payments . . .

Now that the income tax is becoming a real feature of every person's life, it is wise to consider how best it can be paid so as not to find it too much of a burden all at once. Many say they plan to pay it by instalments. The first of these instalments must be paid this month. One twelfth of the total is to be paid before the last day of this month and one twelfth before the end of each subsequent month. The amount to be paid now is similar to that paid last year. At the end of the year a new rate will be paid and the amount already paid will be deducted. The main thing is that in order to take advantage of the installment plan the payments must commence at once.

### Drilling for Oil . . .

A Calgary oil journal is calling on the government of Alberta to spend a few dollars drilling for oil as a business investment. Half a dozen test holes is what is asked for each year. It is pointed out that the province draws down about half a million dollars from oil leases and it could afford to spend a few dollars to help the industry.

There are many complaints at the way in which the oil producing in that province is being administered. Evidently the oil controller is under severe criticism for holding down production to so large an extent at a time when the Empire needs oil and people are being asked to curtail on the use of oil fuels.

The province of British Columbia is spending a small amount of money drilling a hole in the Peace River area. Should they find oil it will be the means of partially transferring interest in the oil industry to this province.

### Not Before Winter . . .

Even if Germany is able to defeat Russia, she cannot do it before winter sets in. As a matter of fact it is not at all sure that Russia can be beaten. It is very difficult for the British to send help because of the distance from the home base. However, that may yet be done and any help given by United States and Britain would be very encouraging to the Soviets. Even if Germany wins the victory will have cost between two and three million men and huge quantities of equipment and ammunition and the end is not yet. Perhaps it may not be easy for them to consolidate or withdraw for the winter.
