PRINCE RUPERT TO FIGURE SOON AS A RAW FUR CENTRE

MERCHANTS DEALING WITH TRAPPERS HERE TELL OF EVER INCREASING TRADE—IMPORTANCE OF THE COMMERCIAL ASSET INDICATED BY BIG FUR SALE IN THE SOUTH.

Amongst the commercial resources of Prince Rupert which are as yet not so noticeable as to say the city's prospects as a fish supply centre, must be numbered Prince Rupert's prospects as a fur centre. That Prince Rupert is certainly going to have a very important place as a central point for the marketing by their obtainers of all classes of valuable raw furs, is a conclusion substantially supported by those merchants in the city who are already trading in furs.

Rupert's Fur Trade Grows.
Every year sees an increase in the number of pelts brought into the city and in the amount of money handled in trading with the trappers. The importance of this is best seen in the accounts of the big fur sale held in Vancouver the other day. It shows what the fur trade means. The sale was held in a Cordova street warehouse and the furs were all disposed of under the sealed bid principle and the high prices realized show that the oft-repeated assertion of fur dealers that the prices of furs are going up steadily has ample foundation.

Value Nearly \$20,000.
The furs in this consignment, which filled an entire floor of the warehouse, were valued at approximately \$20,000 and represented the winter's catch of many a lonely trapper in the wilds of the far north, as well as the more settled portions of British Columbia. They came from all portions of British Columbia, as well as from Alaska and the Yukon. Practically every known fur-bearing animal with the exception of the seal, which is, of course, protected now, and the rare silver fox, was represented in the collection. These fur sales are being held every couple of months and the action of Little Bros. in working up these sales has resulted in a large amount of money being put in circulation in Vancouver. For next to the Hudson's Bay Company, which forwards all its furs to London for the annual fur sales, these sales are now becoming the largest and most important on the continent.

Variety of Skins.
The most numerous animals in the big collection comprising many thousand skins were the humble but much sought after musk rat. Of these there were over 4,500, of which 2,890 came in one shipment alone from a couple of energetic trappers at Pemberton Meadows, who also

sent in 86 beaver captured there. Some particularly fine beaver skins from the interior were among the shipment, several of the individual skins being large enough to cover a bathtub. The approximate number of different skins in this big shipment were as follows:
Beaver, 600; mink, 700; marten, 500; wolverine, 25; ermine, 550; bear, 40; fox, white, 3; skunk, 15; musk rat, 4,500; lynx, 110; wildcat, 6; land otter, 60; fisher, 35; wolf, 20; racoon, 150; coyotes, 20.
