In the Near East, Britain has won a continuous series of victories culminating in the occupation of Iran, which has definitely closed the door to the Nazi dream of the con-

quest of India. "Yet it is in the relations between Russia and Germany that the most amazing change has taken place, surpassing in its completeness and to some extent in its importance, the defection of France. For the first time since the war began the slaughter of soldiers has reached World War dimensions. The mass casualties on the Somme, at Paschaendaele and before Verdun were due to the fact that the war then waged was a war for position where gains could be made only by hurling masses of men against heavily fortified positions.

"It is this mass slaughter for which Hitler in his famous confession of faith and in his speeches has frequently declared that he has no stomach. His campaigns in Europe, save for short spasms of ruthless 'blitz' in Norway, the Netherlands, France and Greece, have been comparatively bloodless.

"It is in his war against Russia that Hitler has made his most grievous and most dangerous miscalculations. He under-estimated the strength of the ally whom he so treacherously attacked and is fighting a foe who possesses murderous striking power and as yet unshakeable morale.

"Hitler promised that he would win his victories without sacrificing the flower of Nazi youth, and the hospital trains that choke the lines into Rumania and the long trenches into which hundreds of thousands of soldiers rest forever, reveal another broken pledge.

"Hitler has a mad bull by the tail and he can't let go."

This world would be a more hazardousp lace for men if Mildred Burke of Atlanta, Georgia, had her way. Mildredi s a woman wrestler. And she's a good one. In six professional years she has grappled nearly 500 times without a loss, she says. She claims the national women's wrestling champion as recognized by the National Wrestling Association and the Midwest Wrestling Association—and no one seems inclined to argue about it. Mildred-five feet two and 130 pounds-is no slip of a girl. She has a 151/2 inch; neck, coal-heaver shoulders, and a pair of legs suggestive of a couple of redwoods. Wrestling, she says has done it, and you, and you, and you could learn to throw your husband around if you only took the time.

"The average woman," observes auburn-haired, 26-year-old Mildred, "spends too much time smoking and drinking. Every woman would be much better off with a little wrestling-just for exercise. They'd learn to take care of themselves." Mildred can, and does. She has, on occasion, wrestled and thrown a 170-pound man. Two of her sisters are ordained ministers of Four-Square Gospel Churches in California. But Mildred wanted to wrestle. Back home in Coffeeville, Kansas, she competed in high school athletics and went to see every wrestling match she could.
