MOSCOW, Sept. 6: (P)-Russian forces, pressing counter-attacks on the approaches to Leningrad, were reported today to have driven the Germans out of the entire zone along a vital railway after a threeday battle. Russian counter-blows were still smashing at the Germans this report said. It did not specifically locate the area which wa claimed to have been cleared of invaders but designated it as a zon between Railway Station "F" and Village "N."



Mix-up In Reporting Speech Of Premier King In London On Thursday

NEW YORK, Sept. 6: (P)-British censorship authorities, in eagerness to prevent advance word reaching the enemy on Prime Minister Winston Churchill's whereabouts, inadvertently contributed Thursday to a Canadian Press error in the account of the address of Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King of Canada to a Lord Mayor's

For reasons of security the censor did not pass reference to Churchill's plans. In sending to North America advance text of the speech of Premier King all his references to Prime Minister Churchill's presence were deleted and approved for transmission only after the speech had been delivered. Through a regrettable editorial error ,the Canadian Press failed to use at once information to corfrect an erroneous introduction to its account of the speech.

The error was that Mackenzie King actually urged the United States to give Great Britain assurance of support against Germany similar to that which Churchill gave the United States last week in case of war with

Holding up of a sentence referring to the Far East made it appear that Premier King had urged the United States to give Great Britain a declaration of support similar to that given to Canada by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in his Kingston declaration.
