INSPECTOR IS HEARD

Alex Turnbull Interesting Speaker Before Teachers' Meeting

Alex Turnbull, inspector of schools, guest speaker of Prince Rupert and District Teachers' Association at the regular monthly meeting on Wednesday evening at the Borden Street School, gave an address on summer school education. This proved interesting to a considerable number of members present. Reports were read by Miss Eileen Gibson, Secretary, and J. H. Nordan, treasurer. J. S. Wilson chairman, read circulation carriers from the Teachers' Federation. There was a discussion among members concerning new report cards to parents. This matter of report cards was considered so vital that it was decided to reserve it for full consideration at the next meeting.

Inspector Turnbull introduced his topic by pointing out that teachers contemplating summer school work should determine their choice of courses with three points in mind—first, improvement of professional rating; second, consideration of the pupils under their care; third, opportunity for obtaining recreation and for advancing themselves educationally.

The inspector went on to describe his enjoyable summer in a teachers' college at Columbia University in 1937. His account of his trip to New York by car and his experiences while in New York was punctuated with descriptive, interesting and amusing incidents—how his alarm clock went off in his luggage while at the customs, his trip through the Chrysler assembly plant at Windsor, the bilingual character of the population between Ottawa and Montreal, taking wrong roads, getting caught in traffic jams, receiving unfavorable notice from police for driving too slowly, unexpected and unwanted interview he had to give before a mike, his visits to the Bronx Zoo, Harlem, Empire State Building, and the Jones Beach with its five parking spaces, one alone built to accommodate 3000 cars.

The appreciation accorded Inspector Turnbull by members was genuine and enthusiastic.

At the close of the meeting refreshments were served by the lady members.

Gardening

A happy gardening year to all who stir the soil and grow things! While I am not pretending that winter is over, there are flowers blooming in the garden and the days are getting longer.

The spring catalogues are arriving and their bright illustrations make us dream of what we might do if conditions were just right and there was no war going on.
