TO PRODUCE MORE FOOD

Women's Institutes Reminded It May Be Decisive Factor In Winning War

FREDERICTON, June 27: (CP)—Realizing that food may be even more a decisive factor in the present war than in the last, country homemakers, who form the largest part of Women's Institute membership have stressed the importance of increased production and conservation of food. Mrs. H. Ducie, Dundurn, Saskatchewan, reported in her national review of W. I. agricultural activities for the past two years at the annual convention.

"The increased production is for home consumption, the surplus to be cured and canned and donated to Great Britain or the needy at home. Commercial supplies will not be disturbed, more vitalizing foods will result and a substantial

reserve created," she stated. Production of certified seeds is an objective of institutes in British Columbia, Ontario, Prince Edward Island and Manitoba.

Provincial Efforts
Alberta members have a food conservation campaign in full swing with the slogan "not an empty sealer in the pantry." Saskatchewan, Manitoba and British Columbia and Nova Scotia are "going in for community canners. The Czech settlers near Prescott, Ontario, are raising goats to start a glove industry.

Quebec and Ontario Institutes have carried out successful rural home beautification projects. Nova Scotia is asking every citizen to enlist as a "soldier of the soil." Prince Edward Island is stressing the importance of better quality for produce.

There will shortly be some people arrive in the interior to have a look at the Cronin mine near Telkwa. Years ago James Cronin had great faith in that property and spent a fortune in developing it, but he passed away before he could bring it to production. The ore is all there yet, but the question is how to raise sufficient funds to complete the job and make it pay.

It is reported that some mining folk are coming from the East shortly to have a look-see at the Duthie mine on Hudson Bay mountain near Smithers. They may take it over. Mr. Duthie is unable to carry on its operation and for some time Mr. Kelly has had a lease on it and doing very well with a dozen men.

Major Angus Davis is in charge of the development of the tungsten property on Rocher de Boule mountain and while the operations will be small at the beginning, he thinks the Red Rose will develop into one of the main producers of tungsten in Canada. He has the road about ready for use to the mill site and is clearing for a mile tram line. A fifty ton mill is to be built and he told the Herald that it will be in operation by fall. Since the Major started to work he has gone a long way. Some forty men are employed and soon it will be a real camp.

Operations at the Hunter Basin gold mine near Telkwa have been resumed. Jack McBeth of Vancouver is the engineer in charge. He arrived a week ago and now Mr. McDonald, one of the chief owners, has arrived.

Timely Recipes

GARDEN PARTY IDEAS

To serve something attractive, appetizing, easy to handle and new, is the object in preparing refreshments for June parties.

Food which can be eaten from the hand with ease as the guest saunters around is the ideal choice. The Consumer Section, Dominion Department of Agriculture, offers the following suggestions:—

For Sandwich fillings—
1. 1 hard cooked egg, 1 teaspoon parsley, 2 tablespoons salad dressing.

2. 1/2 cup minced cucumber, 1/4 cup chopped cress, 2 tablespoons salad dressing.

3. 1/2 cup white cream cheese, 2 tablespoons chopped cress.

4. 1 cup cooked veal, 1/2 cup chili sauce.

5. 1 cup cooked lobster, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup salad dressing.

6. 1/2 cup cooked liver (chicken or calf), 1 teaspoon parsley, 2 tablespoons salad dressing.

If salad is preferred, it can be served in bouchees (little cream puffs) or bread baskets.

For break baskets remove crusts from thinly sliced bread. Press slices into small muffin pans. Bake in a slow oven (275 degrees F.) until lightly browned. Cool before removing. Fill with creamed chicken or a salad mixture which is not moist.

Veal, Celery and Cucumber Salad

2 cups diced cooked veal
1 cup chopped celery
1 cup diced cucumber
1/2 cup salad dressing
Mix together. Chill. Fill baskets just before serving.

Small cakes served with ice cream make the perfect desert for the garden party.
