C.P.C. (A.R.P.) GENERAL ORDER

Having been duly authorized by the Minister of National Defence to act under Section 35 of the Defence of Canada regulations and acting under the authority of said Section 35, I hereby make the following order to apply to the City of Prince Rupert:

When the air raid siren is given all lights of every kind except those behind adequate shades must be extinguished and kept extinguished until the all clear signal is given.

During the period between the air raid siren and the all clear signal the use of any outdoor electric signs of any kind is prohibited. No light signs shall be operated so that they are directly visible from the sky and there shall be no lights showing from unattended premises.

Such further orders as may appear to be necessary or expedient will be issued by me from time to time.
