PRINCE RUPERT MAY LEARN A LESSON IF NOT TOO LATE

MUCH PRACTICAL BEARING ON PROBLEMS IN THIS CITY CONTAINED IN SPEECH BY H. H. STEVENS, M. P., AT NORTH VANCOUVER—WATERFRONTAGE AND REAL ESTATE.

Prince Rupert people will find plenty of food for reflection in the recent speech at North Vancouver of Mr. H. H. Stevens, M. P., who delivered some straight from the shoulder blows on the subject of waterfrontage, with the object of impressing upon his hearers the necessity for keeping North Vancouver out of a similar predicament in which he said Vancouver is today owing to the hold of the C. P. R. on the waterfront.

Real Estate Prices.

He also uttered a note of caution on the question of real estate values and said frankly that waterfront property in North Vancouver was being held at such an exorbitant figure that industries could not come in, and that, further, the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, with its huge association of subsidiary lines, would probably be driven to San Francisco to find dockage because the concern could not see its way clear to pay the prices asked for waterfrontage.

All Same Rupert.

The rise of North Vancouver, said Mr. Stevens, was a most remarkable thing, and people in the east could hardly credit that a city of 8,000 people could arise
