

HALIFAX, Oct. 28: (P) - Druggists and railwaymen, miners and lawyers, are in the field for votes in the Nova Scotia general election today, but once again it is the legal profession that has put up the strongest bloc of candi-

Twenty-one of the entries--11 of the 29 Conservatives and 10 of the 30 Liberals—are barristers. Business in one form or another ranging from five merchants to a manager of a Halifax clothing firm claims 20 of the candidates and the farming and lumbering industries produced another five. Three-one Liberal and two of the six Co-operative Commonwealth Federation nominees—are miners. Two are active and one is a retired railwayman. One is a salesman and another a commercial agent.

Mrs. M. R. Lownds, Conservative standard bearer in Halifax North, is the single woman candidate. The contracting business claims two names, including Fremier A. S. MacMillan.

Three of the men are retired. The insurance world has given another.

Angus Walters, Conservative candidate in Lunenburg, and Lieut. J. R. Fraser, Conservative; in Victoria, were sea captains before they went into business and the army respectively.
