Editorial

COST OF WAR

The cost of the war to Great Britain is said to be nearly fifty million dollars a day, not counting the damage to buildings and material which will have to be replaced. This is a huge sum, so great that it is difficult to think how a country with a population considerably less than fifty million can ever pay it. Possibly it never will do so. While a large part of the cost is being borne by taxation, the remainder is added to the already large funded debt of the country, a debt that never will be paid.

DRIVE IN AFRICA

Before the war Italy prepared for eventualities. She strengthened her garrisons in Ethiopia, had a very considerable army in Libya and every other point was well garrisoned. Knowing her strength, Italy attacked the British at several points, and forced her to retire from British Somaliland.

Then began the building up of a British army in northern Africa and southern Asia. Many Indian regiments were brought in and British units from various centres. Australians and New Zealanders crossed from the Southern Pacific and Arab forces also joined until General Wavell felt himself strong enough to cope with the enemy. The Greeks commenced the forward move in Albania and, just as that was getting under way, the British took the offensive and so far have not been stopped at any point. Today the morale of the Italian army is so low that the men seem to be prepared to surrender as soon as the fighting shows signs of going against them. So far something like 120,000 have been taken prisoners or killed and the enemy is still falling back at every point.
