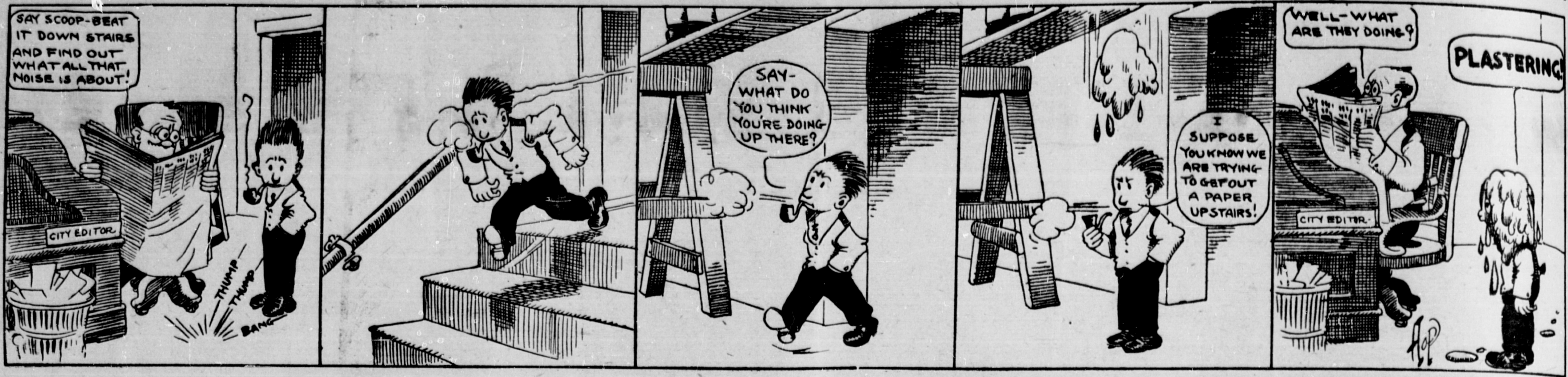

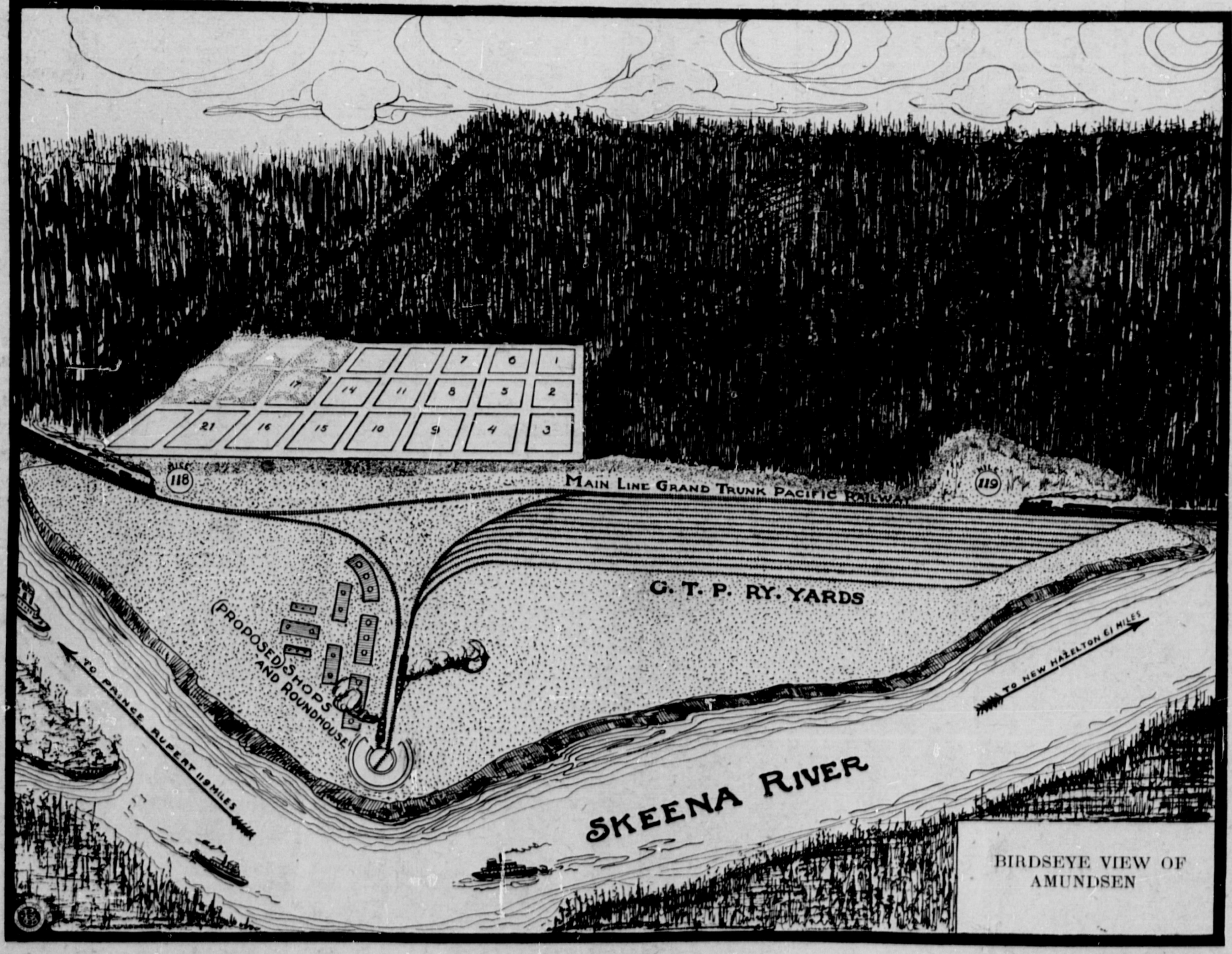
First Grand Trunk Pacific Divisional Point
