New State Church . . .

While no official action has yet been taken it seems; evident that the Nazis are bent on establishing a new state church for all Nazified Europe, including Italy. It is to be the Nationale Reichskirche, representing the new German kultur and German faith. Its chief aim is to annihilate the Christian churches, so far as Nazi-dominated countries are concerned.

Under the new faith the members and adherents will pledge themselves wholly to the Nazi conception of God and will work for the eventual unification of the whole empire under that conception. Church is to be subordinate to the state.

The plan is to remove from churches all Bibles, holy pictures, printing and distribution of the Bible will be forbidden and no importation of subversive books will be allowed, including all religious literature. The Bible will be replaced by "Mein Kampf" and the sword. Mothers have to pledge themselves to raise their sons in the spirit of the German faith.

The new faith does not recognize forgiveness of sins, recognizing that sin is inexorably avenged by the iron aid unsubvertable laws of nature. Confirmation and communion are rejected and the holy day is to be the Friday before Easter with the tenth before Pentecost; as the day of the German family.

On the day when the new church is formally inducted, all crosses or other religious emblems will be removed and replaced by the hakenkreuz as the only unconquerable symbol of Germany.

This is a summary of a document recently discovered as a preliminary memorandum of plans that are being made in Germany, but its genuineness is not guaranteed although it is known to be in line with the most recent Nazi conception.

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
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
