Be Sure You Watch Out . . .

Under present conditions those with subversive inclinations in Canada and the United States find it a little difficult to know how to carry on. For after all, subversive tendencies are very largely temperamental. It does not matter who these people are against. They must be against somebody so they are easily used by a clever organizer.

The Washington intelligence department reports that since the outbreak of the Russo-German war there has been a noticeable decline in the number of strikes. In places where Communists and Nazis had worked together, it has been found difficult to switch the allegiance all at once and, in a few cases, labor troubles have continued as before, indicating that the underlying cause was not wholly political.

Japanese Switch . . .

Now we seem to be practically plunged into the Japanese conflict. The action of the Canadian and American governments has made it necessary to watch the Japanese as potential enemies rather than potential friends. Certainly the moves of the Japanese in the Orient have placed them in the enemy class.

That does not mean that local Japanese are enemies for most of them are British subjects and some of them are British born but they have to be watched. Canadians cannot afford to be taken by surprise. The writers of the Washington Merry-go-Round say:

"Since the expulsion of the Nazi and Italian consulates, intelligence officers have found that the Japanese consulates in Los Angeles and Seattle have become the chief clearing houses for espionage on the West Coast. Japanese residents are sending in a constant stream of reports on airplane production, ship movements and other military information.

"The recent arrest of two Japanese spies in Los Angeles caused a flurry in Japanese quarters, and a number of Japanese rushed to Washington, apparently to place themselves under the protection of their embassy. Others hotfooted for Mexico, which may mean they were planning to shift spy headquarters to Mexico City."

If British people were placed in positions similar to that of the Japanese they would still have strong British sympathies and try to help Britain. We cannot expect the Japanese to be very different from ourselves. We must see that local Japanese are not tempted to play into the hands of our enemy.

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FINE BALL PLAYED AT ACROPOLIS

Dry Dock Beats Rangers; Searchlights Win Over Composites

Bickerton tied the score up again in the seventh when he again crossed the home plate and, finally, won the game in the ninth when he dashed home for his second run. Bickerton really excelled himself by hitting three times out of four, pitching a four-hit game to the Rangers, striking out eleven men.
