War Savings in Prince Rupert . . .

Prince Rupert is not doing well enough in this war savings drive. It is lagging in the campaign, taking extra time to reach its objective. Prince Rupert is not only making a bad showing as a community in supporting the war effort in the easy way. Its people are not even appreciative of a superior investment for investors of modest means.

There is so much to recommend war savings certificates that we should not have to recite their advantages. Suffice it to say that if people refuse or hesitate to invest—not give—their money in this pleasant and voluntary way, it may become necessary to extract it from them by less pleasant, compulsory means.

The appeal is not being made to people who are really unable, over and above their legitimate requirements and means, to put more money into war savings. Rather, the idea is to interest those who have the spare money available to invest in this way without either inconvenience or hardship. There are known to be such people in Prince Rupert. They are showing a very bad spirit and a deplorable lack of appreciation of the situation.

We would advocate the purchase of war savings certificates as the easiest way to contribute to the war effort. In fact, it is no sacrifice at all. Those who are able and hesitate have little to boast about in the way of patriotism or public spirit, no matter how they may endeavor to evade or apologize for their failure.

Prosperity, Not Depression . . .

Although predictions in these uncertain times are dangerous, an era of prosperity and not one of depression may follow in the wake of the war. The pessimistic idea that a depression must invariably follow war is entirely erroneous and historically incorrect. No great war of our times has been followed by a depression. The United States Civil War was followed by many years of almost constantly good business, interrupted by only minor financial disturbances whenever the westward pioneer movement over-reached itself in land speculation. The Great War was followed by 10 years of the best business that the United States and Canada ever enjoyed.

Needs after the war may reach the highest point they have ever reached, with a backlog of unsatisfied demands that may at once take over the industrial facilities expanded to meet war needs.

History does not teach us to expect a depression at the end of any war.

LOYALTY OF JAPS PLEDGED

Port Essington Japanese Society Has Inaugural Meeting

PORT ESSINGTON, Nov. 19:—On Sunday afternoon at the inaugural meeting of the Port Essington Japanese Residents' Society in the Buddhist Hall with almost all the men of the village present, a pledge of loyalty to King and Empire and the promise to serve in any capacity acceptable to the government—military service included—was made by N. Kishimoto and approved by all standing. Reference was made to the fact that Hiromi Tanaka, who recently left Prince Rupert to join the Royal Canadian Engineers lived in this community until a few years ago.

Invited guests at the meeting included three ladies—Mrs. Sedler, the new field matron, Mrs. J. M. Smith, a former field matron, and Mrs. J. H. Donaldson of the Essington Elementary School.

The meeting was brought to order and opened with the singing of "O Canada." I. Miyashita, the president, made a speech in Japanese, in which he welcomed the invited guests and explained the aims and objects of the society. An English translation of the speech was given by the vice-president, M. Mayeda. H. S. Kameda followed with a short speech in English, after which he introduced the members of the executive committee.

Following this, tea was served. H. Fukuhara being the caterer. The Misses Emiko and Sumiko Fukuhara, Yoshie Chashi, Miyojo Nakagawa and Chie Wakabayashi took charge of the tables.

The latter part of the program was made up of a number of short speeches by W. Jones, K. Nagami, R. Vanatter, A. H. Perkins and C. D. Pogson. These were translated by H. S. Kameda and N. Kishimoto.

Before the meeting was brought to a close with the singing of "God Save the King." Mr. Miyashita thanked the guests for their attendance at the meeting. Mrs. Donaldson and Mr. Jones replied on behalf of the guests.

What the society purposes to do may be summed up as follows: To pledge loyalty to King George VI and the Dominion of Canada.

To support and promote as far as possible such national war services as War Savings, Canadian Red Cross, etc.

To offer their services to the country in any capacity that may be acceptable to the Canadian authorities.

To endeavour to preserve and intensify the cordial relations that prevail among the various racial groups within the community.

To supervise the activities of those of their own racial group so that a high standard of living may be maintained, that those in trouble or distress might find sympathy and help, and that all may live in peace and harmony one with another.

The society is forwarding a contribution of ten dollars to the funds of the Canadian Red Cross.
