"It can be said Russia is the one nation in Europe that has been fearing invasion for several years and has had time to place itself in a strong defensive position, that Russian occupation of a part of Poland, the Baltic states and Bassarabia was not due to any plans of conquest, but her desire to strengthen her defensive position and to have an outer line of defence which would delay the armies of Germany and give the Russian army time to mobilize its full strength on Russia's former frontier."

Canada's War Effort Not Good Enough, Says Canadian Legion Head in Discussing Conscription

Speaking on the subject of conscription at Monday night's Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce meeting, H. A. Breen, president of the Canadian Legion, saw nothing to be gained by voluntary appeals. This had been illustrated in the Victory Loan, recruiting, pork products, gasoline appeals. Voluntary enlistment was not fair. Conference On Policing Held


Committee of Chamber of Commerce Meets With Officials
