The Baltic port of Rostock was heavily bombed Thursday night. It is near Stralsund, Mecklenburg, and before the war did some trade with Sweden. It exported grain, flax and cattle. It is now a railway centre and provides a train-ferry service with Sweden. With the intensive bombing of the larger ports Rostock has become increasingly important.

Good News From Japan . . .

It is good news that comes from Japan to the effect that the Emperor has intervened on behalf of peace. We are not suggesting that Hirohito was actuated by motives other than the good of his country. He must know that it would be suicidal for his country to attempt to attack United States and Great Britain with any hope of victory. To call off the dogs of war was to act with circumspection. Recently Britain gave Japan a practical ultimatum and now President Roosevelt has announced to the world that the United States is through with following any weak-kneed policy.


